adequate and the condition of the lot depreciated surrounding properties as well as proving a hazard for children.

Solicitor Leatherland was instructed to prepare an amending by-law providing that after an excavation has been left open for some time, a close board six foot fence would have to be erected around it. The by-law was to be ready for the next meeting. Councilors discussed several other lots in a similar condition around town. Council suggested that payments for rental of the Town Hall be made each week it is used by the Bethel Baptist Mission.

Will Exceed Budget Mayor Rachin expressed alarm at the mileage charged to the town on the police cruiser. He pointed out that at the present rate the amount would be in excess of the budget by the end of the year. The town pays 7 cents a mile. This month's bill was for approximately \$50.

Clerk McGeehan reported that the cost of erection of a fence at the water pumping station would be approximately \$216.07. The matter was left with the sewer committee to investigate.

Change Hours To Vote A discussion on the nomination and election by-law brought only a suggested change in the hours of voting from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Mayor Rachin reported that some residents felt the jobs of scrutineers and poll clerks were not distributed well enough and the same people got the jobs year after year. It was pointed out that experience was beneficial in carrying out the duties. Appointment of the election officers was left for consideration at the next meeting.

The meeting convened at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday evening and adjourned at 2:34 a.m. Wednesday morning.
