Former Actonian Dies in B.C.

Older Acton friends will learn with regret of the passing of Lewis Orr on Thursday, September 4th at Vancouver, B.C. He was 75 years old. The funeral was held on Saturday and burial was in the Returned Soldiers' Plot, Mountain View Cemetery.

Lewis Orr was born in Georgetown and for many years was a resident of Acton and well-known here. He went to Vancouver in 1908 and for the past 33 years has been in the real estate business. He served overseas in the First World War with No. 3 Canadian General Hospital and 11th Field Ambulance, attaining the rank of major. Surviving are his wife; a daughter, Mrs. William H. Myhill-Jones, and two grandsons in Vancouver, and a sister, Mrs. Joseph Church, Kellher, Sask.

made to make children of indigent persons responsible for hospitalization and burial costs.

An Acton firm, Jones and Van Gils, was the low bidder and was awarded the contract to construct a new bridge on the second line at Peru at a cost of \$4,800. The county will supply the cement and steel for the job. Bruce George Leslie, chairman of the roads committee, advised members of this. He also said this bridge was damaged when a heavy truck demolished the bridge last August 5. Damage was caused by a Lewis Transport truck and the company has been notified they are being held responsible for replacement of the bridge. The matter is in the hands of the county solicitor with instructions to take action for recovery of the damage.

Accounts approved and ordered to be paid included: finance \$4,851.00; county buildings \$600.00; hospitalization \$3,042.27; Centennial Manor \$600,818.81; assessment \$44,455; printing \$905.02; county roads \$32,773.28; agricultural and reforestation \$1,125.74.
