Principal Reports On School Opening

With a full board of trustees and Chairman Cakes presiding, the public school board met in the new school at 7:30 p.m. at their regular meeting, Tuesday, September 2.

Principal McKenzie reported that 14 classes were held in the school, with a total attendance of 456-81 kindergarten primary Mrs. Dill and Miss Kirby; 33, grade 1, Mrs. Algor; 31, grade 1, Mrs. Gamble; 38, grade 2, Miss MacKay; 36, grades 2 and 3, Miss Brada; 36, grade 3 and 4, Mrs. Little; 35, grade 4, Miss Anderson; 34, grade 5, Mrs. Wilkinson; 34, grade 5 and 6, Mr. McKeown; 34, grade 6, Mrs. Foster; 30, grade 7, Mr. Smith; 37, grade 8, Mr. McKenzie.

Principal McKenzie explained that the children were accommodated with very little confusion, that the K.P. test was taken in their new classroom and the pupils were assembled in the classrooms used last year.

The board adopted the policy with dairies that each dairy would deliver milk for K.P. room all day, morning and afternoon, delivery as the largest class would be held in the morning.

The Department frowns on children starting school before the age of five years. The board strictly adheres to the established rule of accepting enrolment of children who attain the age of five by December 31st.
