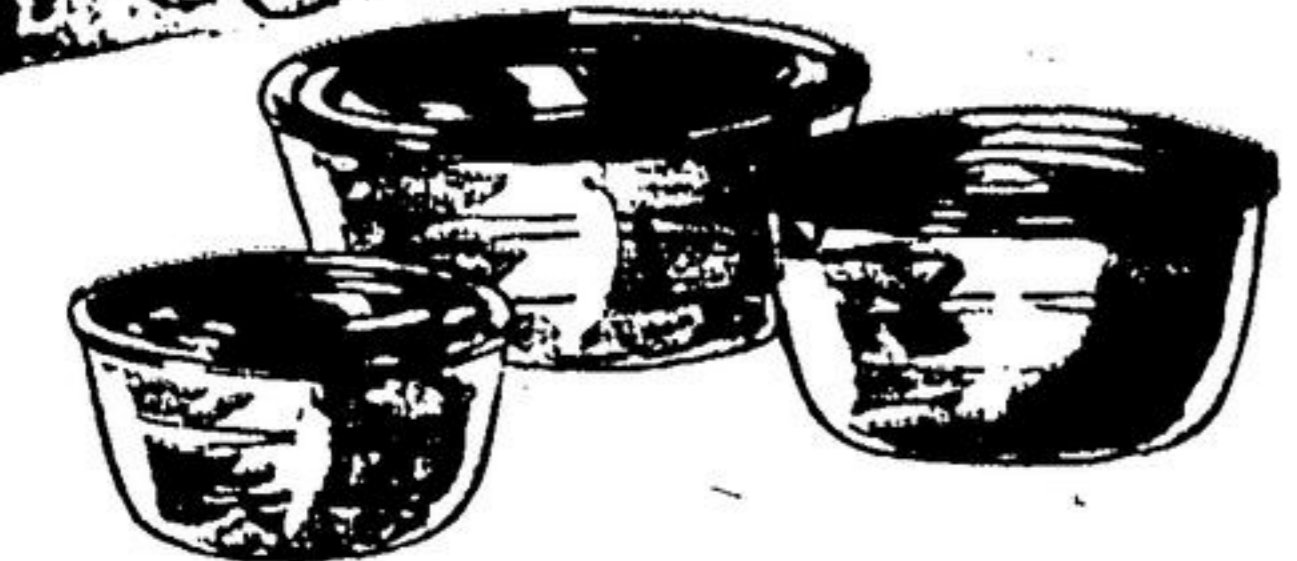

**THE LOST PHAROAH'S**  
 by Leonard Cottrell

Just why, nobody knows, but there are many, many people who have never been off the North American continent to whom the history of ancient Egypt is strangely fascinating.

Our interest by no means stops at the Sphinx and the Pyramids, one of the wonders of the world. Many in imagination burrow into the old tombs of kings and princes and hunt with the archaeologists for bits of pottery and bractelets and inscriptions on the wall.

Leonard Cottrell has written "The Lost Pharaohs" for these amateur Egyptologists. While the history of England or China or Italy reminds one of school, the history of Egypt seems full of romance.

And so it is! This book is first rate entertainment. Mr. Cottrell says, "This is a book for the amateur by the amateur... twelve years' experience in writing of B.B.C. documentary programs has taught me that 'popular' approach to a subject is no excuse for inaccuracy... public interest in things Egyptian is far more widespread than most scholars are aware."

The volume is liberally illustrated. Of course he treats the subjects that at once come to mind—the fantastic feat of the building of the pyramids, the opening of tombs, the famous temple of Amun-Re at Karnak with its tremendous carved pillars, the Rosetta stone, mummies—everything including the people today.

One of the greatest discoveries of all was the tomb of King Tutankhamen. One fabulous day in 1922 revealed an Egyptologist's prize!

Howard Carter, who had twice before come within two yards of the entrance step to the last tomb in the valley where it was found without knowing it, said "at last we had the whole door clear before us."

"With trembling hands I made a tiny breach in the upper left-hand corner. Darkness and blank space as far as an iron testing-rod could reach. Candle tests were applied as a precaution against possible foul gases and then widening the hole a little, I inserted a candle and peered in. Lord Carnarvon, Lady Evelyn Herbert and Callender standing anxiously beside me to hear the verdict. Presently my eyes grew accustomed to the light, details of the room emerged slowly from the mist, strange animals, statues and gold—everywhere the glint of gold. For a moment—an eternity it must have seemed to the others standing by, I was struck dumb; then Lord Carnarvon inquired anxiously—"Can you see anything?"

"Yes," I replied, "wonderful things."

**Was Born in Acton**  
**Dies in 88th Year**

Edmund Albert Hemstreet, of Aylmer, Ont., died on Thursday, September 11, at St. Peter's Infirmary, Hamilton, after a three-month illness. Born in Acton, in 1864, the son of the late William Hemstreet and Agnes Moore, his education was made at Rockwood Academy and he passed his early years in Gloucesterville, N.Y., and in Colorado.

In 1894 he married Minnie Minerva Moss, who died 12 years ago. Mr. Hemstreet was assessor for the Town of Aylmer for nine years and secretary-treasurer for Aylmer and East Elgin County Fair for a similar number of years. Lately, he has been employed as a real estate broker.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. T. H. Zavitz (Anna), of Ridgeway, Ont.; one son, William E., of Hamilton; and four grandchildren. A second son, Orland Edward, predeceased him in 1942.

The funeral service was at Barnum Funeral Home, Aylmer, on Saturday with burial in Aylmer Cemetery.
