Johnny Mckee, one of Acton's livest merchants, ended his, career in Acton with a fire and ventured into a line of bug killer. He composed a mixture of time, whiting and paris green with which to sprinkle the potato plants the Colorado beetle, or potato bug, intested. Thousands of packages were put in green wrappers in the stable, which stood on the property on John St. afterwards bought by W. H. Storey for his fine residence, Sunderland Villa, now the Victor B Rumley Funeral Home.

One season sufficed in the bug killing business for Johnny Mckee and he moved to Parry Sound to engage in the lumber business.

Dr. Coxe built the big brick garage where the Plastonics. firm and the bowling alleys are now located. It is related that Acton's first grocery store was built on this site. Miller Hemstreet called it the "Danville Grocery."
