Bees' Nest Humming As Thistles Hold 2-1 Edge

Crucial game of the best in five series with Streetsville faces the Acton lacrosse club tonight (Thursday) in the arena. After tying the set up at one game apiece with a smashing 28-8 victory on Saturday, the B-Hives were edged 11-10 in overtime Tuesday night in the Streetsville Bowl, giving the Thistles a 2-1 edge on the series. Streetsville won the first game by a 17-13 margin last Thursday.

Tonight's game will be the sternest test the Acton club has met this term, but if it follows the pattern set by the first two games, the B-Hives should win handily and stage off elimination at least until Friday when the fifth and deciding game is scheduled for Streetsville. That gives the Thistles an advantage over the Acton club, something they seem to have had from the start of the series.

Misfortune has been plaguing the efforts of the B-Hives ever since the series started with injuries to Norm Young and Johnny Brunski shelving both of them. Brunski suffered a compound fracture of his arm in the first game at Streetsville in which Young also was hurt, aggravating injuries sustained to his knee earlier in the season and which had forced him to play below par and not at all in the two previous games.

Jim Robertson has been filling in for Young in the nets and has come up with bang-up efforts, especially in Saturday night's game here in which the B-Hives rolled to a win in front of a crowd estimated to be in excess of a thousand.

First game of the set saw Young replaced by Johnny Krapak in the third quarter, and Krapak, although he let in some soft ones, played well for his first time in the nets. He had no easy time for the Thistles marched in singly, in doubles and in fours and fives to take shots at the net without much resistance from B-Hive forwards.

Cruikshanks and Burton were the marksmen who set the pace for Streetsville in this one, with three goals each, and Ron Madgett, Widdess, Clark and Wilson added two apiece. For Acton Haines, Gerrie, Quinn, McCandless, and Wilson tied twice with singles going to Brunski, Krapak, Townsend Beaumont and Landoni.

Only two penalties were handed out in the game, both of them to the Thistles, who were hard pressed to finish the game on top after a strong bid by the B-Hives threatened to tie it up in the final quarter.

On Wednesday morning, a special assembly will be held in room 1 so that additional names may be placed on the list of nominations for president and secretary.

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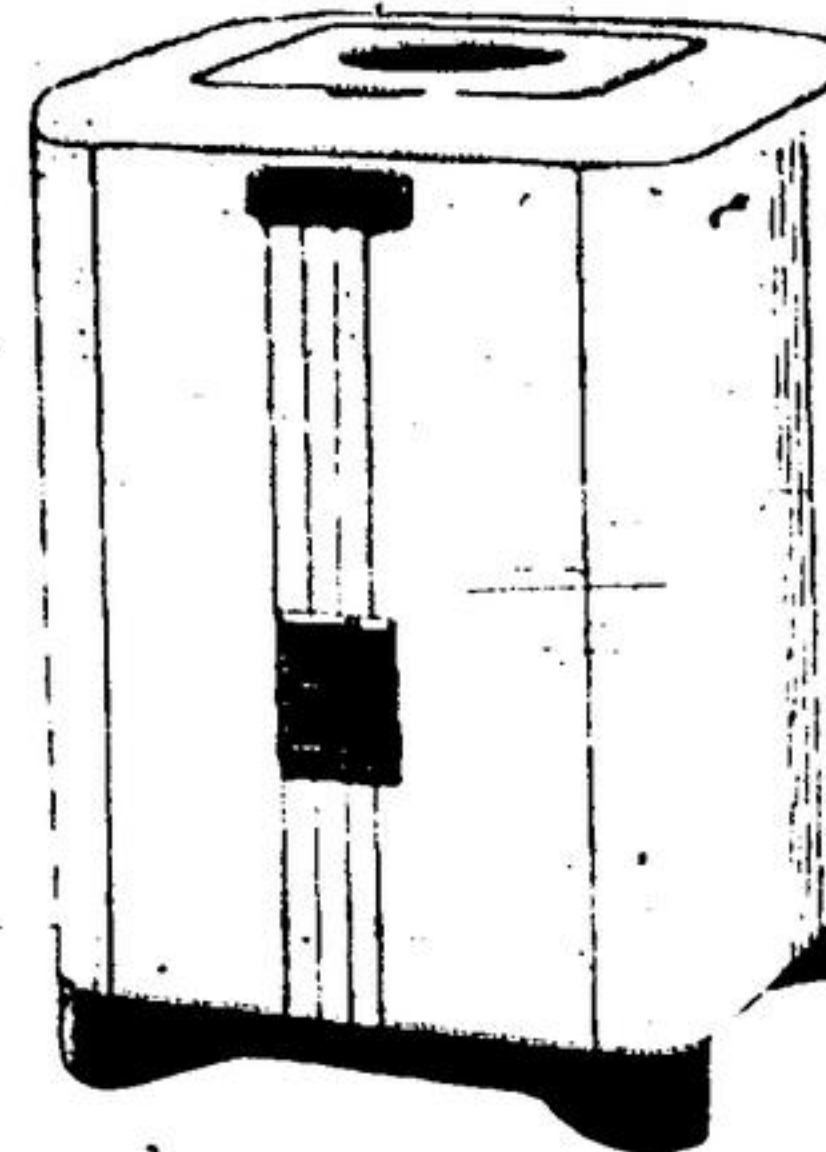
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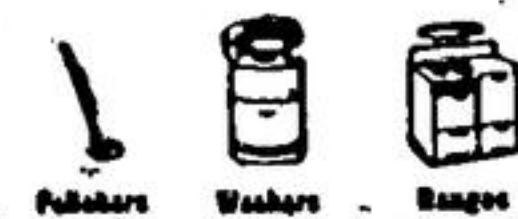
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
