### Even Series Sat. In Caledonia Win

Caledonia evened their best out of three series with Campbellville Intermediate hardball team on Saturday afternoon as they took a close 7-6 decision in a loosely played ball game.

The home team outhit the victors 13-10 but loose defense play cost them the game as four of Caledonia's seven runs were unearned. Two costly errors by Bob McPhail in the first inning gave Caledonia two runs but Campbellville came back with three in their half and two more in the second as they knocked Duncan, the Caledonia starter, out of the box with an 8-hit barrage.

In the fourth inning, Caledonia closed the score with 5-4 as they scored on a single, a fielder's choice, an error by Jack Laking and a single by Neilson, who had replaced Duncan.

The visitors tied the score at 5-5 in the fifth inning and went ahead 7-5 in the seventh when Fedorko hit a long home run following a walk to Lawrence. Campbellville got their final run in the seventh when Bill Roberts was hit by the pitcher, Henderson singled, Laking was hit by the pitcher and Roberts scored on McPhail's fielder's choice.

Campbellville suffered a bad break in the first inning when Early stopped Fedorko's drive with his bare hand and suffered a bad cut taking four stitches to close.

Henderson for the losers gave up 10 hits and struck out eight, while Duncan and Neilson for Caledonia allowed 13 hits and struck out three. Fedorko was the big gun for Caledonia with two singles and Harrison came through with two singles. Henderson led the Campbellville attack with a home run and three singles. Ken Moore, Jack Laking and Bill Roberts each had two singles. Joe Roberts hit a double and Jack Roberts and Bill Cairns each had a single to round out the home team offensive.

### Drop Third Game At Caledonia Wed.

Campbellville bowed out of baseball competition on Wednesday afternoon at Caledonia as they dropped their third game of the series with Caledonia with a score of 10-5.

Once again Campbellville came back and tied the score 5-5 in the first of the sixth when Jack Roberts walked and Brian Moore sacrificed, and when Roberts dug in for third the first baseman threw high over the third baseman's head and Roberts scored.

Caledonia sewed it up in their half of the sixth when three consecutive singles and an error by McPhail produced two more runs. In the eighth, they garnered three more on two singles, a triple and an infield out. Campbellville strenuously protested the triple on the grounds it landed foul but the umpires said they didn't see it land and it went into the trees fair.

Duncan and Neilson shared the pitching duties for Caledonia, giving up seven hits, five walks and striking out five. Jack Roberts for Campbellville allowed 13 hits, six walks and struck out 14. Harrison and Lawrence each had three singles for the winners while Daniels had a homer and a single, Gyorko and Sabo two singles each and Fedorko a triple.
