Disabled Persons Allowance Passed

It is expected that some 2,000 persons will qualify for the new Disabled Persons Allowance as of September 1, it was stated by the Honorable W. A. Goodfellow, Ontario's Minister of Public Welfare.

"While the legislation was passed at the last session of the Legislature and has only been effective since July 1, it is evident that many of our most seriously disabled persons will benefit to the extent of \$40 monthly," Mr. Goodfellow stated. "The Minister added that this legislation is the first of its type in Canada.

Inasmuch as The Disabled Persons Allowance Act is new, the qualifications are restrictive, with the emphasis being placed on home care rather than institutional care. The major types of disabilities appear to be paralysis, including cerebral palsy and polio cases, mental defectives; arthritis who are deformed or suffering from osteoarthritis or rheumatoid arthritis; neurological diseases, such as multiple and disseminated sclerosis and Parkinson's disease, deformities, severe heart and cancer ailments.

The qualifications of the applicant only are considered, not those of the immediate members of the family.

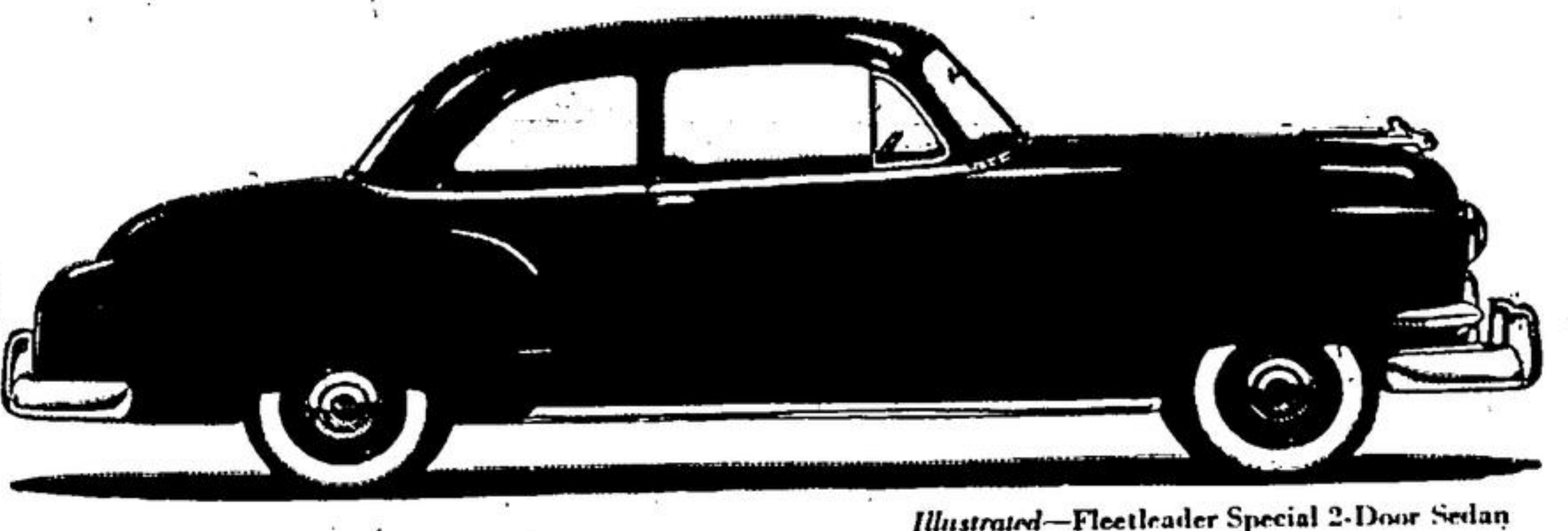

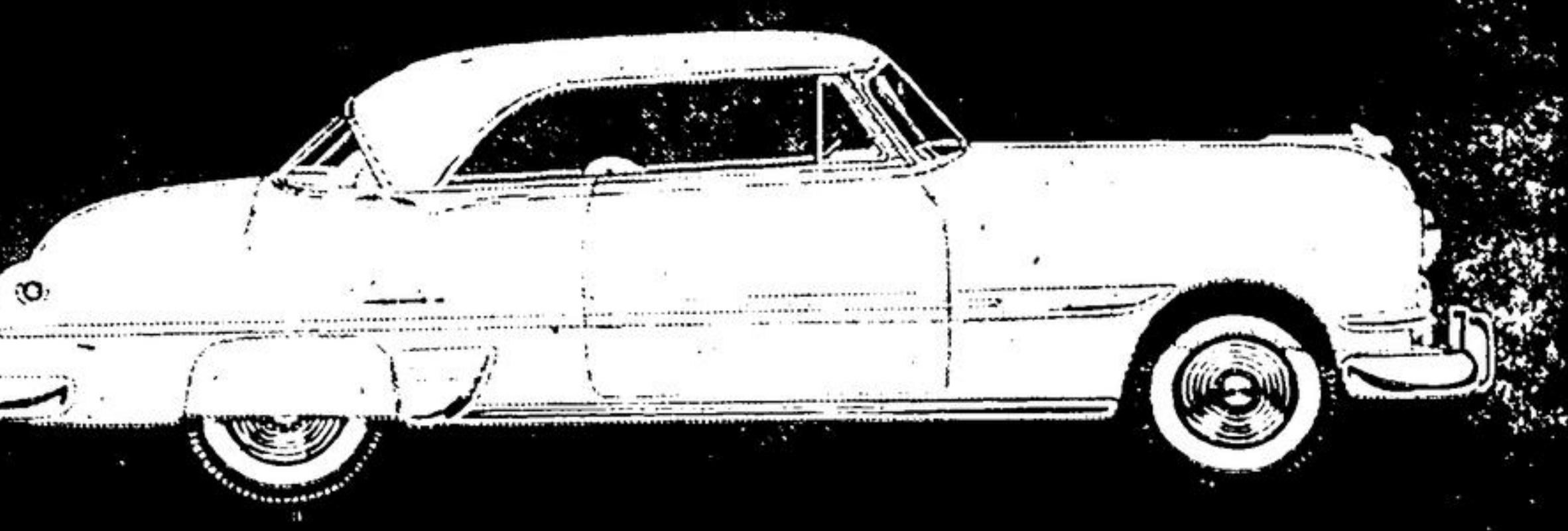
