THE MIXING BOWL
Hello Homemakers! Such an abundant crop of good quality tomatoes as we have throughout the province this year. Tomatoes are a delicious adjunct to a meal and as decorative as they are good. Big meaty slices with a sprinkling of finely minced chives or onion and salt or a little French dressing may be served in place of a second hot vegetable at any meal. The old-fashioned way is also good, that is, place tomato wedges on lettuce and sprinkle with sugar.
When tomatoes are broiled, plain-baked or pan fried, they are cooked in ten minutes. For an elaborate "bake," stuff the tomatoes with well-seasoned crumbs and minced ham or a combination of two or more leftover vegetables combined with cream sauce.
Tuck tomatoes into the menu whenever you can. Broil thick slices, skin on, with the steak for dinner or the bacon for breakfast or the sausages for supper. Stew them as a side dish and occasionally sprinkle with cheese. Add tomatoes to a casserole of corn, spaghetti, rice or what have you. Minced tomatoes enrichen a meat loaf mixture—and of course, fresh tomato soup is tops.

- Broiled Tomatoes**
3 firm tomatoes
salt and pepper
1 egg
1/2 cup creamed crumbs
2 tbsps. butter
3 tbsps. brown sugar
1/4 tsp. curry powder
Wash tomatoes and cut thin slices from tops and bottoms; then cut in half crosswise. Sprinkle both sides with salt and pepper and allow to drain. Dip in beaten egg, then bread crumbs or cornmeal. Dot with butter and broil, first on one side, then on other, turning carefully. Mix brown sugar with curry powder, sprinkle over tomatoes, dot again with butter, and broil quickly. May be served either as a garnish or a vegetable; allow 1 whole tomato when served as a vegetable.
- Chili Sauce**
10 large ripe tomatoes, peeled and chopped
3 medium apples, peeled, cored and chopped
1/2 cup celery, finely chopped
1 green pepper, seeded and chopped
1 sweet red pepper, seeded and chopped
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. ginger, ground
1 tsp. ground cloves
1 tsp. ground allspice
1/4 cup cider vinegar
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
Place all ingredients in preserving kettle and cook over low heat until thick, stirring occasionally to prevent burning, about 2 1/2 hours. Sometimes, after an hour of cooking, we strain off the juice and boil the juice down until it is thick and

syrupe, then return it to kettle, bring to boil. Seal in sterilized jars. Makes 2 quarts.

THE QUESTION BOX
Mrs. L. Mc asks: Have you a recipe using ginger ale in a mayonnaise that is quite thick?
Answer:
Ginger-Cheese Mayonnaise
1 1/2 tbsps. unflavored gelatine
1 bottle (12 oz.) ginger ale, chilled
3/4 cup grated sharp cheese
3/4 cup chili sauce
3 tbsps. grated onion
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 1/4 cups mayonnaise
Place gelatine in saucepan; slowly stir in one-fourth of ginger ale. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until gelatine has dissolved (do not boil). Cool, but do not allow to set. Combine remaining ingredients; blend in cooled gelatine, little at a time. Slowly add remaining ginger ale. Place in refrigerator; stir several times during chilling to make dressing creamy-smooth. Store in refrigerator. Stir with fork before serving.

Miss E. D. asks: Can you suggest a quickly prepared tomato aspic?
Answer:
Tuna-Tomato Aspic
2 tbsps. gelatine
2 cups tomato juice
1 7 oz. can tuna fish, chunk style
celery
onions
stuffed olives
Soften 2 tbsps. unflavored gelatine in 1/2 cup tomato juice. Heat remaining tomato juice to boiling point. Add gelatine and stir until dissolved. Chill until slightly thickened. Add 1 can flaked tuna fish, 1 1/2 cups chopped celery, 2 tbsps. grated onion, 1/2 cup sliced olives, 1 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Pour into a 1 1/2 quart mold and chill until firm in refrigerator.

prepare a Peach Ice Cream pie?
Answer:
Peach Ice Cream Pie
graham crackers
sugar
butter or margarine
1 pkg. raspberry-flavored gelatine
lemon juice
1 pint vanilla ice cream
Combine 2 cups graham cracker crumbs, 2 tbsps. sugar and 1/4 cup melted butter. Press evenly into a greased 9-inch pie pan. Bake at 350 degs. Arrange a thick layer of cooked peaches. Dissolve gelatine in 1 1/2 cups boiling water. Add 2 tbsps. lemon juice, then chill until slightly thickened. Beat gelatine with ice cream until well blended. Pour over the peaches. Chill until firm. Garnish as desired.
