CHURCH EXTENSION, PROGRESS TOPICS AT PRESBYTERY MEETING

Church extension provided the focus for discussion at the fall meeting of the Halton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada, which took place at Lowville on Tuesday, October 7. This was sharpened by a report from the Rev. Keith Love of the remarkable progress of the newly constituted congregation at Port Nelson and a resolution calling on the Home Missions Committee to prepare an overall scheme for church extension, including Burlington, the area north of Freeman and Oakville. The meeting was chaired by Rev. J. M. Smith of Georgetown and devotions conducted by the newly settled Rev. W. J. Holley of Freelon-Strabane. New ministers welcomed to the Presbytery included the Rev. Holley, Rev. E. W. Dearney at Appleby and W. G. Leck, student minister at Ashgrove-Hornby.

During the day, the court was addressed by the Rev. John I. Leng, M.C., B.A., B.D., assistant secretary of the Home Missions Board of the United Church of Canada and the Rev. Beverly L. Oaten, M.A., M.B.E., director of the newly constituted Lay Training Centre at Five Oaks near Paris, Ont. The Rev. John Leng strongly commended the active lay participation in developing the new Port Nelson congregation and said that his Board would have every confidence in supporting similar efforts in other sections of the Lakeshore area.

Reports of the General Council of the United Church held in Hamilton recently were presented by three presbytery commissioners to the council, J. S. Terry of Freelon, the Rev. J. B. Moore of Waterdown and the Rev. James I. Blair of Milton. Confronted with the greatest challenge to engage in expansion work in her whole history, the United Church of Canada is making an effort to achieve the necessary financial resources, to institute a campaign of evangelism and to include a larger percentage of women on the Boards of the church.

Inter-church relations are steadily growing more cordial as evidenced in the address before the council of the Anglican Bishop Hallam and the first visit to the Council since Union in 1925 of the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church, Dr. J. A. McInnis.

A scheme to place the United Church paper, the Observer, in every church family was adopted and commended to the churches. The field of family life is brought to the forefront in a "Christian Family Life" program for which each church is being asked to appoint a special officer.

Greetings were sent from the Presbytery to the churches at Milton and Carlisle, which are celebrating their centennial anniversaries. St. Paul's United Church, Milton, has been marking this occasion by a complete renovation of the church buildings and a series of four Sundays of special services conducted by former ministers of the church. The Carlisle hundredth anniversary will be further underlined by the publication of a history of the church written by the minister, the Rev. G. E. Almack, B.A.

A growing desire for a closer association among the elders throughout the presbytery found expression in a motion introduced by J. L. McKindley of Burlington to convene a rally of elders in November. This was strongly supported and arrangements are to go forward under the capable leadership of Mr. McKindley, A. S. Mahon of Campbellville and the Revs. Moore and Almack.
