Oakville Important To Toronto Daily

Most of the controversial political headlines appearing in The Toronto Daily Star in the recent Ontario provincial election and in the Federal election of 1952 were possibly written by the president of the Star Publishing Company, Harry Campbell McArthur.

Associate editor Pierre Berton, author of the article entitled "Hindmarsh of the Star" reports that one memorable headline in the federal election which used the word "God Save the King" was written by Hindmarsh and Charles in an interview of Star director and lawyer Alex Stark. "Stark, a staunch Baptist felt it was vaguely blasphemous and perhaps unparliamentary as well as the article reports. He persuaded Hindmarsh to change it to "Vive St. Laurent" in the second edition.

The article also reports that the Star dropped 700,000 in circulation for the first time in its history, the peak month of December following its special coverage of the provincial election.

As their father's career and work in the Star is about the reputation of the Star, the salary paid to the vice president, who is the Ontario Foundation which is a charitable organization. Hindmarsh says that he is paid \$10,000 except for Mrs. H. H. Hindmarsh's salary with it.

The article reports the Star as a one-man operation, run by Hindmarsh. It reports the president can change the salaries sent out at his discretion. The Star Santa Claus Fund and the Star's special sale are played on the Star radio program.

The writer says that Oakville where Hindmarsh has lived for years is "to the Star the most important small town in Canada. It chronicles the town's minutiae in minute detail. When BA Oil began building a refinery near the Hindmarsh home, Star reporters combed the area gathering critical opinions charging that it would pollute the beaches."

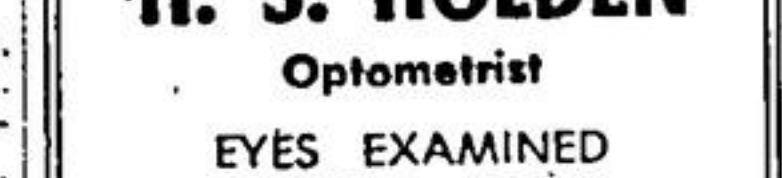

FLYING OFFICER J. A. Tarzwell, of Georgetown, and Acton, Ont., a pilot with the RCAF's 416 Squadron was among personnel moving to Europe this month when three RCAF Sabre-jet squadrons flew the Atlantic via Greenland, Iceland and Scotland to Gros Tenquin, near Metz in northeastern France. On arrival at Gros Tenquin, the three squadrons brought Canadian fighter strength in Europe to six squadrons, half of Canada's proposed air contribution to NATO. Three squadrons have been stationed at North Luffenham, England, for some months. The peacetime presence of Canadian fighter squadrons in France will mark another milestone in RCAF history as did the Atlantic crossing en masse, of more than 60 aircraft in "Operation Leap Frog II."
