


In cool weather, warmth is an important factor in saving pigs. Where electricity is available, heat can be supplied from a reflector should type electric broader. This broader is placed in a corner of the pen where the sow cannot disturb it A brooder provides heat for the young pigs and keeps them away

from the sow. After the first three days, the danger of pigs being crushed drops. but the danger of annemia increases. To prevent this condition, I. A. Charrette reports that enough reduced fron to cover a ten cent piece should be given to each pig on the second day after birth and repeated twice at weekly intervals. By treating the suckling pigs individually, every pig in the litter will receive the correct dose and the danger of loss from anaemia is

Creep feeding is usually started at three weeks of age. Since sows may not be capable of supplying enough milk, skim milk should be supplied if it is available, along with sifted oats. If this is impossible, a commercial pig starter can
