HALTON NIGHT SCHOOL

The announcements relative to the third annual County Night School to be held in Milton this coming Fall and winter are, we understand, now in the mail.

In all cases \$1.00 must accompany the application. Incidentally all applications must be sent forward to the Milton office of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Eighteen courses are being offered, namely:

- 1. Clothing (a) Elementary Clothing; (b) Advanced Clothing; (c) Tailoring; (d) Children's Clothing; (e) Needlecraft, which includes one or more of the following—Needlepoint, Smocking, Crocheting and Tatting.

PERSEVERANCE PAYS OFF FOR TWO DAIRY-FARMING PLOWMEN AT CARP

Perseverance paid off for two dairy-farming plowmen when they won the East Trans-Atlantic Class at the International Plowing Match held this year at Carp, Ont.

For Algie Wallace, 35-year-old bachelor farmer, from North Gower near Ottawa, it was his seventh attempt at the Dominion horse plowing crown, a gold medal and six weeks' trip to Europe.

Douglas S. Reid, 26-year-old farmer from Brampton reached his goal—the tractor plowing crown—in six years. Last year he placed third in the Trans-Atlantic Class.

Over Four Fires Per Hour Average

All through the ages man has been prone to take an apathetic view of dangerous conditions which are apparent to ordinary reasoning, and eventually catastrophe occurs.

In 1951 there were reported in Canada, 66,159 fires causing the death of 494 persons and property loss estimated at over \$80,000,000.

It is the old story of "it can't happen to me" and until such time as a fire occurs and affects a particular individual, fire wastage is regarded as "just one of those things."

On an average, every 10 or 15 minutes a fire occurs in some home, institution or manufacturing premises causing untold disfigurement, loss of lives, homes, factories and jobs.

The tragedy of these fires is that most of them are caused through carelessness.

ACTON PEOPLE AND ACTON PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS



On the site where the Presbyterian Church now stands was the first Adam's block as we learned earlier. The building had many tenants until the Adams and the premises were destroyed by fire one Sunday evening about 9 o'clock in September, 1870.

The fire originated in this barn, but whether from a pipe or a lantern was never revealed. The old frame buildings built like tinder. Every effort was made to get out the horses but the rescuers failed to remove three of them. The fire swept the house and leaped the lane to the store and dwelling of T. Eb- bage and these were consumed.

It jumped thence to Charlie Wigan's unshop and licked it up, rags, bones, bottles and all and many could remember Charlie ringing his hands and crying in his German-English, "Oh mine rags, mine rags. I will be ruined quite." (To be Continued)
