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

ACTON PEOPLE AND ACTON PLACES THROUGH MANY YEARS

For more than 20 years the site of the Adam's block was practically vacant. It was used for gardening purposes, but no buildings of importance were erected there. Finally it came into the possession of John R Kennedy.

In the meantime the congregation of the old Preshyterian Church, which had been in use for 47 years, began to feel that a new church, more commodious and modern, was needed. Rev. J. W. Rae, the minister then in charge, fostered this idea. A subscription list was circulated and there was a very generous financial response.

This site was selected and secured, plans were drawn and the corner stones laid on September 12, 1894. With appropriate ceremonies the stones were laid by Rev. J. Goforth, missionary to China and the other by Archibald Campbell, J.P.
