FINE WEATHER, STIRRING MUSIC ADD TO LEGION CHURCH PARADE

Fine weather and stirring music added color to the annual church parade of Zone Seven of the Canadian Legion in Acton last Sunday afternoon. It was the first time the Zone had held their church parade in Acton since the last war.

There were representatives present from the eight participating branches, Bronte, Port Credit, Oakville, Brampton, Milton, Georgetown, Streetsville and Acton. The Oakville Legion Pipe Band and the Port Credit Bugle Band were in attendance.

Zone Commander Hugh Lamb was in charge; Max Storey of Acton was parade marshal and William Matlock, as president of the host branch, was in charge of arrangements.

The annual church parade in peace time is reminiscent of the wartime custom of holding a church service before every major engagement.

The service was conducted in Knox Church, Acton, by the Acton Ministerial Association. Rev. E. A. Curry, himself a padre in World War II, preached a stirring sermon, "The Bible and Good Citizenship." D. L. Patterson led the responsive reading of Psalm 46 and read the word from Hebrews 10. Rev. Robert H. Armstrong led in the pastoral prayer. Rev. Ralph E. Price was unable to attend because of a service in Rockwood at the same hour.

Following the service, the parade fell in and marched off to the music of the two bands.
