**THE MIXING BOWL**

 HELLO HOME-MAKERS! Meat makes the meal because it gives us a feeling of being well fed. However, it is always pleasant to enjoy meat that is tender, flavorful, juicy and appetizing in appearance. To have all these attributes we should observe one rule. Cook meats at low instead of high temperatures. If you haven't time to cook a certain cut of meat slowly until tender, then something like bacon and eggs will be more acceptable. The method and the cooking period used to cook meat depends largely on these questions:  
 Is it a tender or less tender cut? Is it a large chunky piece or meat that is easily sliced? Can it be served medium rare or must it be well done? Remember that good cooking costs you less, not more, than poor cooking!

**Steak Casserole**  
 1 lb. round or chuck steak  
 1 tsp. salt  
 1 tsp. paprika  
 2 tbsps. flour  
 2 tbsps. fat  
 1 onion, sliced  
 4 potatoes, sliced  
 1 cup tomatoes  
 1 tbsps. catsup  
 Cut the steak into 4 pieces. Season and pat on the flour, then brown in hot fat in a heavy skillet. Turn meat into casserole and add remaining ingredients. Cover and bake at 350 degs. Cook about 1 1/2 hours. Serves 4. (Add water, only if necessary.)

**Sausage-Sweet Potatoes**  
 1 lb. sausage meat  
 2 cups mashed sweet potatoes  
 1/2 cup orange juice  
 1 tbsps. grated orange  
 1 egg, beaten  
 4 tsp. salt  
 Pan fry sausage slowly until well browned. With a fork, beat mashed sweet potatoes, orange juice, gratings, egg and salt. Arrange the sausage in a deep pie plate. Spread on potatoes. Bake at 375 degs. for about 30 minutes. Serves 6.

**Lamb with Kidney Beans**  
 1 lb. lamb riblets  
 2 tbsps. fat  
 2 tbsps. salt  
 flour  
 2 1/2 cups tomatoes  
 Pan fry sausage slowly until well browned. With a fork, beat mashed sweet potatoes, orange juice, gratings, egg and salt. Arrange the sausage in a deep pie plate. Spread on potatoes. Bake at 375 degs. for about 30 minutes. Serves 6.

**How About Private Telephone Booth?**

Someone once remarked that you could learn more about a person's habits by peering into his closet than by studying his behaviour for a month. In one sense this is quite true. In the great majority of cases however, the disorder of many of our closets results from our failure to realize that a minimum space can give maximum service. It's mainly a matter of organization.  
 Take hall closets, for instance. Did you know that they can sometimes be converted into attractive little powder rooms for your guests? These may be painted in such delicate tints as oyster white, lavender, rose, soft blue, or peach color. The walls of the hall should, of course, be taken into consideration in planning the scheme. If space permits, the ideal arrangement is to equip your powder nook with a small vanity. But if your closet is small—or you can devote only part of it to this purpose—a mirror can be screwed to the inside of the door and a small shelf with a raised edge can be added below it.  
 In one modern home the paneled hallway was painted in a soft tone of blue-gray while the walls of the closet and the inside of the door were coated with a glowing tint of peach. The powder box shelf and frame of the mirror were enameled in deep terra cotta. Silver toilet articles completed the attractive picture.  
 And again, have you ever thought of converting a hall closet into a telephone booth? Such a transformation makes it possible for the users of the telephone to have quiet when the rest of the household is noisy. It also insures a degree of privacy which may not be possible otherwise.  
 In choosing a color scheme for a telephone booth, you can select a variety of colors—forest green, graced coral, or deep turquoise. Keep it in mind, however, that the lighter the color the lighter your booth will be and the less artificial light you'll need for making memos. In one hall painted bottle green the walls of the telephone booth were coated with a chartreuse while the shelf and bench were enameled with the deeper green and edged with rich crimson for accent.  
 Clothes closets too call for a lot of ingenuity. For the man of the household, trouser and tie racks and some extra shelves will help to relieve the congestion while certainly you have your own ideas about what you need.  
 Bring color, light and a gay idea of decoration to the same closet and it will turn into the snowy swan of fairland fame. The trick lies in using color magic.
