Following the approval of council by resolution earlier in the year, members passed a by-law to set the rates of pay for members of county council. Under the new rate the warden will receive \$600 per year, while councillors will receive \$8 h day with 10 cents a mile for mileage to meetings.

After considerable discussion and deliberation as to procedure, members approved a recommendation of the road committee to purchase a 100 horsepower deisel tractor grader from the Adams Company at a cost of \$24,184. It was .explained the government would subsidize the purchase under the 1953 budget. Reeve G. Leslie told members the equipment was necessary and it could be well used for snow removal as well.


