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 Pianos Tuned, Repaired and Rebuilt

Did you know that a set of bells usually not more than 15 in number, tuned to the intervals of the major scale is called a chime. A larger set with chromatic intervals, is called a carillon. And the largest ever made in England are installed in Riverside Church, New York. However, we shall hear many carillon chimes and bells throughout the season, especially over the radio. . . Bells seem to say repeatedly, "Peace on earth, goodwill toward men."

Beat egg whites and cream of tartar in large bowl until stiff. Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt into a smaller mixing bowl. Make a well and add oil, egg yolks, juice, water and vanilla. Beat 3 minutes on mixer. Pour first mix gradually over whites, folding with a rubber spatula until blended. Fold in cherries and nuts. Pour into ungreased 10 inch tube pan. Bake at 325 for 55 minutes, then at 350 for 10 minutes, or until cake does not dent upon touch. Hang to cool over inverted funnel.

King Tut Had T.B. Town Sees Progress

Some of the skeletons of prehistoric man show evidence that tuberculosis existed before the dawn of history. King Tutankamen evidently suffered from tuberculosis.

The writings of both ancient China and India have references to it and it was common enough in Greece for Hippocrates, father of medicine, to give a very good description of it about 400 B.C.

In Europe it appears to have spread northward from the Mediterranean. For centuries it was the leading cause of death, outranking other diseases, war or famine. Plagues from time to time took terrible death tolls but they were occasional while tuberculosis went on steadily year after year.

It remained the leading cause of death in the world until well into the 20th century.

During all these centuries thousands of people tried to find a cure. They tried hundreds of concoctions of animal, mineral and vegetable matter. They tried charms, rituals and incantations. Various climates were tried and a variety of exercises. Nothing worked.

The beginning of a change dawned when in 1882 Robert Koch, a German doctor, isolated the tuberculosis bacillus. Once it was proved that the disease was caused by a germ mankind got a new start.

It was about the same time that a few other doctors began to find that rest seemed to work wonders in helping their patients. Out of this grew the movement to provide sanatorium care.

During the last 25 years there have been many developments which have helped to change the picture. Among these are: the great increase in places for treatment of patients; the improvement in the usability of X-ray machines, so that it is feasible to give chest X-rays to a whole community, thus finding cases before they are suspected—when they are most curable and when danger of infection of others is at a minimum; early discovery also speeds recovery; new drugs, while not replacing rest as the basis of cure, are very helpful.

Surgery which aids treatment has advanced greatly. Clinics have become much more numerous and more people go to them; people know more about tuberculosis and go to the doctor sooner.

The war against tuberculosis is being fought right here in town this week before our very eyes. Progress is underway on December 18 and December 19.

Hear Devil's Knell On Christmas Eve

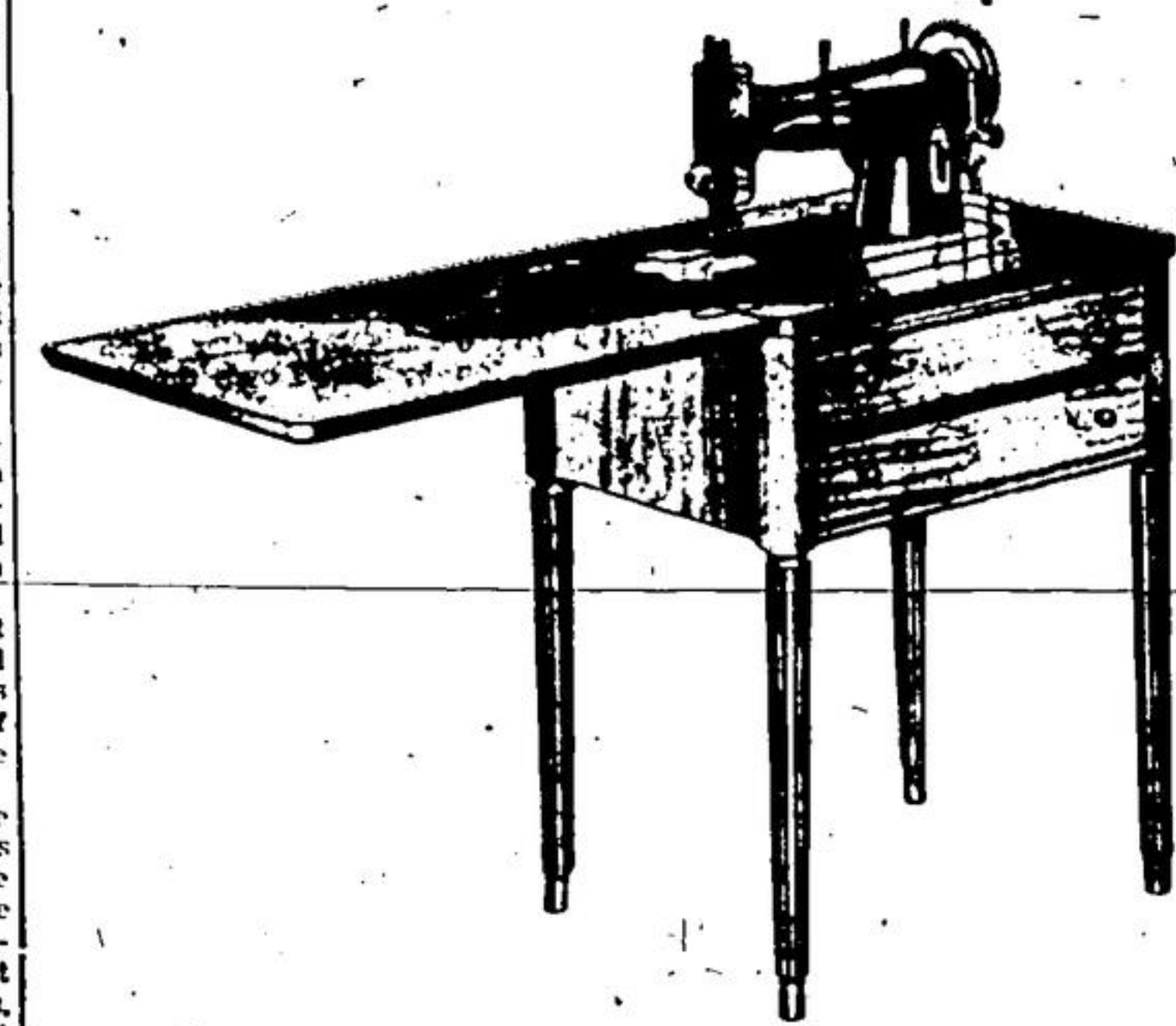

The bell became known as the Devil's Knell and every Christmas eve it is tolled once for each year of the Christmas calendar.

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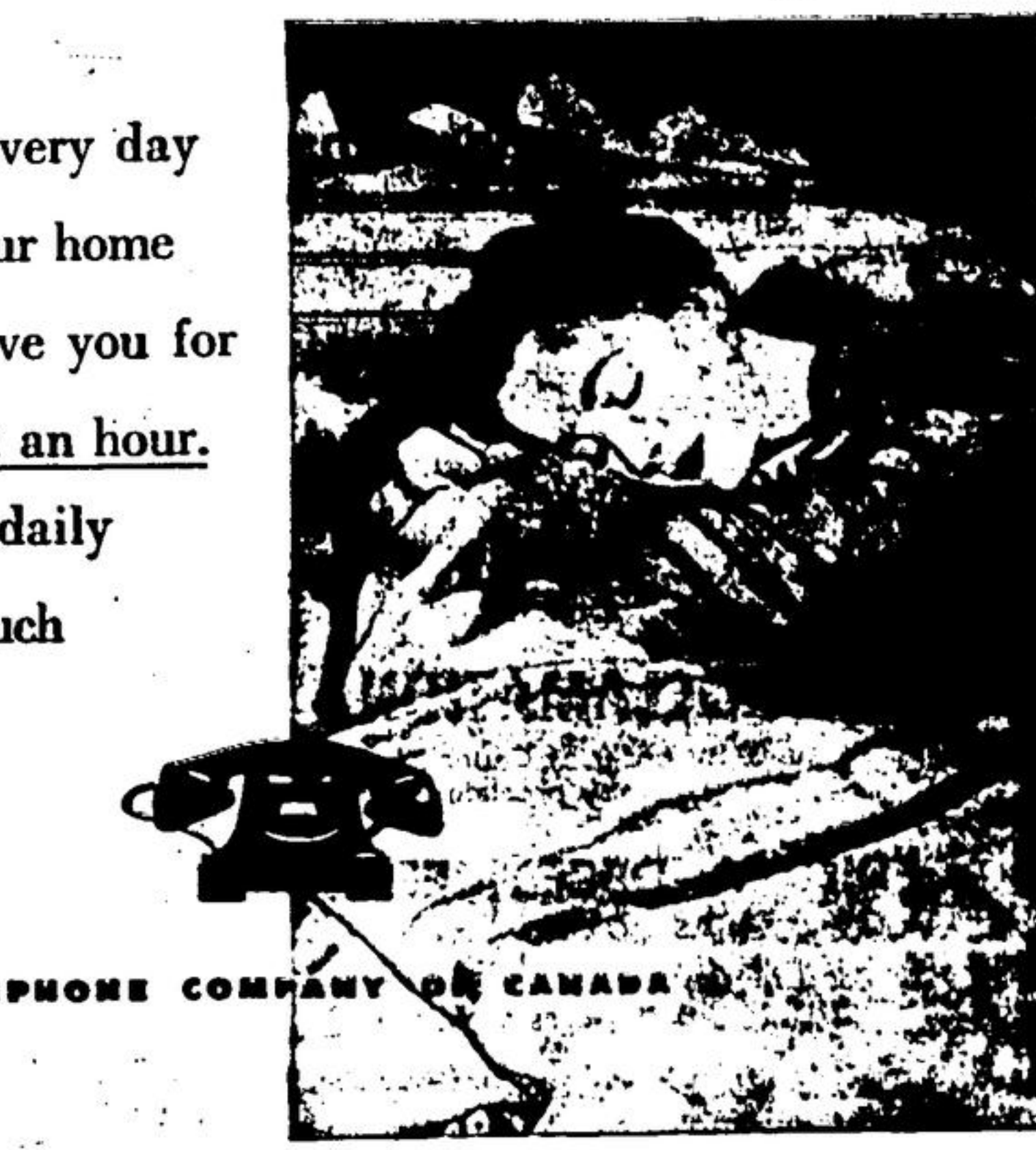

REQUESTED RECIPES

Almond Shortbread (for Mrs. J. T.)
 1 cup butter
 1/2 cup white sugar
 1 egg yolk
 1/4 tsp. almond flavoring
 3 cups sifted flour
 1/4 cup milk
 Cream butter, sugar, egg yolk and flavoring together. Sift flour and add milk. Beat quickly, using finger-like roll out 1/4 inch thick and cut in strips. Twist into bow knots or cut wreath shape. Brush top with egg white. Sprinkle with a mixture of 1 cup slivered almonds and 2 tbsps. sugar. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes. Makes 5 dozen.

Meringue Filbert Bars (for Miss J. M.)
 1/2 cup butter
 1/2 cup icing sugar
 1/2 cup shortening
 1 cup sifted flour
 1/4 tsp. salt
 Mix ingredients thoroughly. Press into ungreased 8 x 12 pan and bake at 350 for 15 minutes. Cool crust spread with 1/2 cup red currant jelly and spread with meringue of 2 beaten egg whites into which 1/2 cup sugar, 1 cup minced filberts and 1/4 tsp. cinnamon are folded. Return pan to oven for 35 degs. for 25 minutes. Cool and cut into bars. Makes 3 dozen.

Cherry Chiffon Cake (for Mrs. C. E.)
 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
 2 1/2 cups sifted sugar
 3 tps. baking powder
 1 tsp. salt
 5 cup cooking oil
 5 egg yolks
 1/2 cup maraschino juice
 1/2 cup cold water
 1/4 tsp. vanilla
 1 cup egg whites (for 8)
 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar
 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
 1/2 cup drained, cut maraschinos

Festive Party Punch for 50
 2 large tins pineapple juice
 1 large tin orange and grapefruit juice
 1 1/2 cups white sugar
 1/2 cup dry mint leaves
 2 large bottles ginger ale
 1 large carbonated water
 1 small jar maraschinos
 Combine fruit juices and sugar, soak mint in 1 cup boiling water then strain and add. Just before serving add bottles of cold ginger ale, carbonated water and drained cherries; also ice cubes.

Cranberry Pie
 2 tbsps. cornstarch
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 3 tbsps. water
 1 tsp. melted butter
 1 lb. (4 cups) cranberries
 Plain pastry

Mix cornstarch and sugar; add water and butter. Add to washed cranberries. Fill 9 inch pie plate lined with pastry. Top with strips of pastry. Bake at 450 for 10 minutes, then at 350 for 30 minutes.
