Plan Ford Assembly To Start in May

A pilot assembly line is scheduled to be in operation in May at the 13-acre Oakville plant of Ford Motor Co. of Canada Ltd. Rhys M. Sale, president, reported.

In a year-end statement, he said that the company produced 132,193 motor vehicles last year, compared with the previous high of 129,026 in 1950.

Mr. Sale said the company could have built an additional 24,000 units had it not been for labor difficulties, material shortages and other factors.

An extended work schedule will give workers an opportunity to earn substantial overtime pay during the next few months, he said.
