REVIEW WORK, HALTON LEADERSHIP TRAINING SCHOOL HELD IN DECEMBER

For some time, farm people recognizing the need for more efficiency in conducting their meetings have asked for some assistance in Group Leadership Training.

Immediately after registering, we formed a circle and by means of singing games we were introduced to each other. We then assembled for community singing, led by George Atkins, Bromie, with Mrs. R. Coulter at the piano.

Mr. Sim briefly outlined the purpose and aims of the Training School by taking the parable of the apple tree which needs to be fed and nourished in the right type of soil.

At 12 noon we adjourned to an adjoining room where lunch was prepared in banquet style and with Mr. Atkins presiding at a head table.

At the conclusion, Clifford Waite, Provincial Farm Radio Forum secretary, voiced his comments and constructive criticism of this procedure, giving kind criticism where necessary as well as praise where it was deserved.

The afternoon session, in small group discussion of "Program Planning," proved interesting and we concluded some of the basic principles were (a) purpose of our program must reflect the needs and interest of our people; (b) planning of our program before starting and after the meeting to meet the needs of the organization; (c) enthusiasm cannot be bought, we must be sure all have a specific job to create interest; (d) budget or finances of our organization need careful planning and in conclusion, shared leadership.

"Parliamentary Procedure," being our next topic for discussion, proved helpful, as we considered the proper procedure of calling a meeting to order with an agenda on hand previously prepared by chairman and secretary. All business conducted by each person who wishes to voice his opinion, rising and addressing the chair, after which chairman announces the name of the person speaking and advises the meeting this person now has the floor.

The vote is carried, lost or defeated, and recorded. An amendment cannot change a motion, but can add to the motion, omit part, or substitute a part. In case of a motion, an amendment or an amendment to the amendment, all must be moved, seconded before the discussion and the latter comes first, the amendment next and the motion last. Reports of convenors of committees are brought in merely as recommendations.

"Duties of Officers" was our next discussion topic. A leader of a group must first know and have knowledge of his subject before attempting to lead the group in discussion. He should acquire a liking for people and have respect for the other person's opinion as well as the courage of his convictions.

At the conclusion of a meeting emphasis is placed on the fact that participants do all the talking and yet seeing that all participated in the discussion.

Meetings should be well planned either by dramatizing, demonstrating, films, debating, mock parliament. There are many avenues of entertainment which give interest and enthusiasm to meetings. Everyone in a community is a potential leader.

On Tuesday we assembled and enjoyed a film on Parliamentary Procedure, which depicted the findings of our discussion of the previous day. After our singing and plans for the day were made, we divided into our customary groups for the discussion topic, "Discussion Methods."

At the conclusion of lunch we had an active demonstration on the conducting of a business meeting, conducted according to parliamentary procedure, with chairman presiding, secretaries' minutes read and adopted, as well as the treasurer's financial statement. The meeting concluded with motion for adjournment.

Mr. Clifford Waite delivered comments on these demonstrations, which proved our shortcomings as well as pointing out our stronger and more commendable points.
