

**MALTON FORUMS REPORT**

**FARM ORGANIZATION PROFITABLE  
FEDERATION PRESIDENT DECLARES**

"It pays to belong to farm organization," said M. M. Campbell, president of Nelson Federation of Agriculture, at the "Getting to Know the Federation of Agriculture" meeting of Nelson farm forums held Monday evening in the Nelson township hall.

The chairman quoted figures to illustrate the success of co-operative enterprises, and also to compare the financial position of the farming industry in relation to big business. He reminded his listeners that farmers have the opportunity to make their needs known in a democratic way through local Federation units and farm forums, with resolutions which go to the county, then to the provincial organization, and from there to government or the body which exists to deal with the problems.

Farm forum members in attendance from Tucks, Limestone and Zimmerman forums heard reports

on the annual O.F.A. convention from Mrs. Gordon Gray, who reported on "Women in the Federation," and R. S. Heatherington, who outlined the resolutions that came up at the meeting, all of which he said were, "The voice of the people back home on the farms."

A feature of the program was the panel discussion on county and township federation work. Participating were A. R. Service, who dealt with the structure and membership; M. M. Campbell, who explained financing; R. S. Heatherington, who outlined past achievements and marketing schemes; Mrs. Gordon Gray, who explained the objectives; and Vernon MacArthur, who pointed out some of the problems ahead in 1953.

Discussing the problem of how to make more people aware of what the Federation has done and can do for them, the opinion was voiced by several present that a \$5 or \$10 membership fee for individual membership might be one means of accomplishing this end. "Labor unions do not hesitate to collect generous dues," one spokesman said. "The Federation should do likewise."

Some of those present were surprised to learn the Federation had been responsible for 25 or more projects and improvements in the county or townships. While it was true, they knew they were enjoying these benefits, not everyone had realized these had materialized as a result of Federation effort. The suggestion was made that a printed list of this work should be put in the hands of every farmer in the county.

During the social period, Mrs. Roy Coulter led in a lively singing and the meeting concluded after the usual refreshments, although discussion continued until the door closed on the last departing member.

**CANADA'S GREATEST NEED IS FOR  
SPIRITUAL, CULTURAL AWAKENING**

The greatest need for Canada today is for a spontaneous movement among the community at large towards spiritual and cultural awakening. Such an awakening will, in considerable measure, depend on the success of the Folk School Movement.

When leadership training is undertaken by government agencies, emphasis is always laid upon skills and techniques. The people who ask for courses are looking for that, and the employees of the elected government understand that it is their duty to give the people what they will vote for.

When leadership training is undertaken by the churches, the underlying assumptions have a sectarian bias which tends towards a disintegrated community, and the special emphasis usually lies upon the specifically religious aspects of life rather than the development of the whole man.

The Folk School Movement, with its command of techniques through the co-operation of all the government and secular educational arms, and with its own special emphasis on spiritual values and principles as the foundation of all culture, provides the needed bridge between the secular and the religious life of the community at large.

The Folk School method, again, is fundamentally sound since it provides impetus to the truly enriching

experiences of spiritual growth and attainment. In some, indeed, it brings about something almost analogous to rebirth. The embryo child at birth begins to do things for itself. Before then it is a complete passenger for whom everything is done. After birth it begins itself to breathe, to feed, to stretch and cry, to will, to see and feel, to perceive and understand; to walk and talk; really to live as we know life.

So during a person's teen-age years a similar process of emergence should be taking place in his inner soul when, through the impact of some catalyst an inner awakening begins. Thereon the youth or man

begins consciously and of set purpose to "lay hold of life" and to develop the many latent powers with which he is endowed. With inner desire awakened, the youth will not rest until his inner urge to fulfillment has been satisfied. Provide him with facilities and his aspirations will blaze into a fire which readily imparts itself to those he shares them with.

The Folk School Movement has the secret of providing both catalyst and facilities in a special way. By bringing the right people together at the right time under the right conditions the scene is set for a vitalizing experience in which "one blazing soul sets other souls ablaze." In doing this it rightly points to values friends and fellowship as the

key which unlocks the door to a richer life.

The most important qualifications for leadership are a proper sense of values, a clear understanding of the proper goals to which a leader guides, and a firm grasp of the techniques we employ. If we have men and women going out into our community imbued with these qualities and possessed of the confidence which comes through self-expression and practice, we need have no fear for the future.

They can only go out if they come in to the School which is able to equip them. Will they come in? That is the problem we must strive with might and main to solve, because upon its solution depends, in part, the far-reaching issue of the nature of the future culture of our land.
