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COST OF LIVING

But this index does not tell us what it costs to live. It compares present-day costs with those of some time in the past and shows the percentage of increase or decrease during the interval.

The time in the past selected for these comparisons is called the base period, and at present it is the five years 1935-1939.

The reason for choosing those particular years was that the countries keeping records of these things thought it would be a good idea if they all used the same period in making their comparisons, and 1935-1939 was the period agreed on.

Society to Open Part-Time Offices

Statistics from the Children's Aid Society for the month of January showed that 59 child protection cases were open at the end of the month with 53 children involved.

The regular Children's Aid Society Board meeting was held in Milton on February 10 with seven members and the superintendent in attendance. Mrs. W. A. Weaver, president, presided when the accounts for the month of January, amounting to \$1597.47 were passed for payment.

One hundred visits were made in this particular department. There were 215 children in care with a total of 105 visits.

It was decided to have the purposes and objects of the Society, as set out in Letters Patent, printed in leaflet form for the information of Society members and interested citizens.

There was a lengthy discussion on the report of the recent county survey carried out by the Provincial Department of Public Welfare, and it was agreed that steps would have to be taken to strengthen the services of the Society particularly in the lower end of the county. By resolution, it was decided to open part-time offices in Burlington and Oakville as soon as the necessary space might be available.

The Superintendent was instructed to send a letter of appreciation to Mr. Beaumont, Director of Child Welfare, for work in conducting the survey.

It was decided to purchase a Tape Riter for use in the Society office.

After adjournment, coffee and sandwiches were enjoyed, these being provided by the two Burlington members, Mrs. Weaver and Mrs. Lee.
