Prof. Sim on Panel Re Study of Forums

The international implications of Canada's National Farm Radio Forum will be discussed in the regular Farm Forum broadcast of next Monday, March 16 when a study of the program made by the United Nations Educational, Social and Cultural Organization will be reviewed by three men who made important contributions to the study.

They are O. J. W. Shugg, director of publicity for the Dairy Farmers of Canada; R. Alex Sim, assistant professor of political economy at the University of Toronto; and P. James Griffin, a sociologist at the University of Toronto. Mr. Sim is well known in Halton; the recent Folk School was held at his home.

The study was financed and undertaken by UNESCO with the idea that the Farm Forum technique might be applied on a world-wide basis, with particular benefit to those countries that are backward agriculturally. Farm Forum has already served as a model for similar organizations in other countries.

Those studying the situation have come to the conclusion that wherever Farm Forums have been set up successfully, they have helped among other things, to restore the sense of community or neighborliness that was once the principal characteristic of rural life.

The weekly discussion broadcast throughout the winter provides the occasion for farmers to get together to talk over mutual problems, and to discuss the broadcasts and study the printed material which is sent out to all groups.

National Farm Radio Forum is a co-operative effort of the CBC, the Canadian Association for Adult Education, and the Canadian Federation of Agriculture. The radio phase of the project numbers more than thirteen hundred listening groups, making it the most extensively organized program of its kind in the world.
