PREVALENT AS COLDS

The Canadian Mental Health Association reports poor mental health is the No. 1 problem in the health and welfare field in Canada today.

Extreme causes of poor mental health use as many as about 80,000 hospital beds as all cases of physical illness put together. Nervous disabilities (the neuroses) are five times as prevalent as these more extreme mental cases — they are as prevalent as the common cold.

Since the war 441,000 Canadians have received free transfusions of whole blood plasma from the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service.

MOST DEATHS

The Canadian Heart Association reminds us: "Diseases of the heart and blood vessels now constitute the largest group of deaths in Canada each year, approximately 50,000 annually. Nearly half of the deaths of people over 50 years of age fall into this group. Diseases of the heart and blood vessels cause three times as many deaths as cancer, five times as many as violence and accidents, and eight times as many as tuberculosis.

When starting a car in mud, sand or on ice or slippery snow, engineers suggest you put the car in second gear—or even high—and release the clutch slowly so as not to spin the wheels. When stalled in deep sand, traction may be increased by letting a little air out of the rear tires—but don't forget to reinflate them immediately afterwards.

WHEN POLIO STRIKES

If polio strikes in your home do everything your doctor advises. Doctors agree that poliomyelitis can best be cared for in hospital. Good medical care may prevent or correct some deformities. 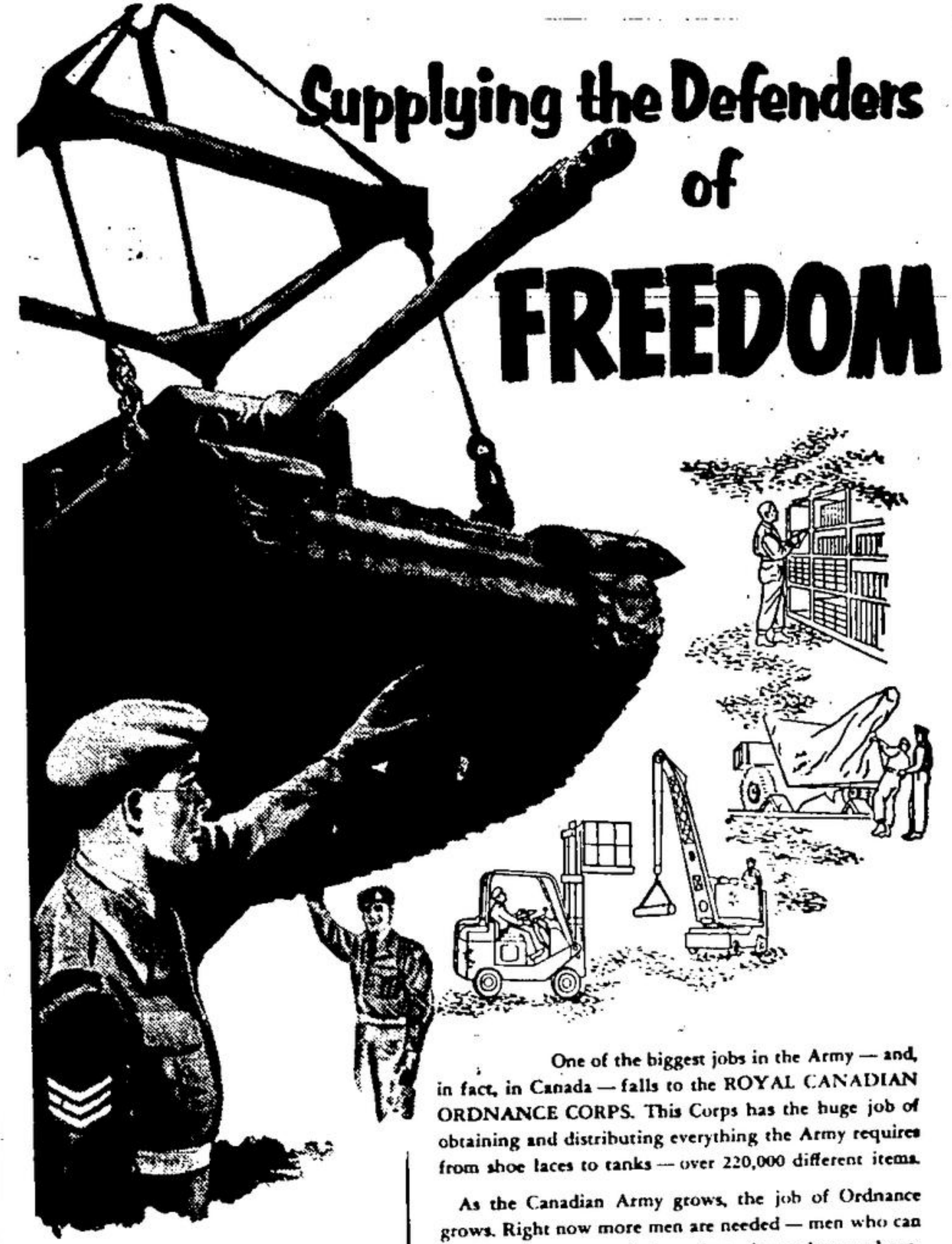
