The figures from the monthly report for February were given at the regular board meeting of the Children's Aid Society in Milton on March 10. Mrs. W. A. Weaver, president, presided and the meeting opened with prayer. The following directors were present:

Figures from the report for the month of February showed a total of 118 children under care at the end of the month, 39 of these being in paid boarding homes. Nine new cases were reported in the Child Protection Department, with 59 cases open. A total of 196 calls were made in the Child Protection and Child Care Departments.

The board was informed that arrangements have now been completed for a member of the staff to be in the Legion Hall in Burlington each Friday afternoon from two to five. Similar arrangements are expected to be completed for Oakville very shortly, as soon as suitable space is procured.

The accounts for the month of February, amounting to \$1,712.44 were approved for payment.

As Rev. John Munro of Oakville is going into the Armed Forces as a Chaplain, he submitted his resignation as director which was accepted with regret.

The superintendent reported that D. Coughlan, director of probation services for the province of Ontario, has agreed to speak at the annual meeting in Milton in April.
