

Attractive Homes Important - Forums

"More attractive homesteads" were discussed by 521 Ontario farm forums on Monday evening, March 9. The groups were unanimous in their opinion that it was very important to have an attractive homestead.

The forums had many suggestions for improving the appearance of the homestead with little cash outlay, such as: keeping the place tidy, planting shade trees and flowers, destroying weeds, trimming the lawn, doing repairs to fences and buildings and painting.

South McNaughton of Renfrew county said: "Plant a few trees, shrubs, vines and flowers. Pick up all rubbish and keep place tidy. Cut the grass. Put a little paint on the most prominent places."

The groups thought the more costly improvements could be fit-

ted into the farm budget by doing a little each year, by systematic saving, by farm improvement loans and by buying such things as paint sprayers on a co-operative basis.

92 per cent of the forum members have done some farmstead beautification during the last three years and 72 per cent thought a rural beautification project would serve a useful purpose in their community. Green Park of Wellington thought: "A beautification project would be useful to increase value of your own farm and the community would have more appeal to those buying a farm and to the young people."

Bowlers Eligible For Empire Games

At the annual spring meeting of the Provincial Lawn Bowling Association of Ontario, in Toronto last Saturday, an announcement was made which is important to every individual man bowler in every Lawn Bowling Club in Ontario. At the British Empire games, which will be held in Victoria, B.C., in July 1934, competitions in lawn bowling will be part of the program. Canada is to be represented by a team of seven men who will compete in singles, doubles and rinks competition. The provincial division champions will play off at Winnipeg two weeks before the Empire Games to allow time for practice in Victoria.

Those who will represent Ontario will be those who win the P.L.B.A. championships this year. This will give every club, no matter how small, a chance to qualify for the big event. The Ontario champions will have a chance to qualify for the right to go to Winnipeg where they will meet the champions of the other Canadian Division. The second stage of the 1933 championships will be played at Brampton on July 25. Before that date bowlers of this district, number nine, will have to be found by elimination, their district champions and, before that, each club will have held their own championship competitions to determine who will represent them.

There is a chance for every lawn bowler to have the very great honor of representing Canada. Local bowlers hope this district will make the grade in at least one of the events.

A resolution was passed at the meeting to raise a fund during the coming season which will be turned over at the end of the season by the P.L.B.A. to the Crippled Children's Fund of the Canadian Sportswriters and Sportsmen's Association.

It was suggested that every club might hold a Crippled Children's Tournament and perhaps have "Spiders" before regular tournaments to raise money for this very worthy cause. Each bowling club will receive information on this subject direct from the Secretary of the P.L.B.A.

With the lawn bowling season only a few months away the executives of the various clubs are getting busy with plans. District Club presidents will be holding their annual spring meeting very soon to arrange district tournament dates. All this makes summer seem very close!
