Fashions in Food

- 1. Individual casseroles (porcelain or heat-proof glass) are being used for the main supper dish... 2. Tossed salads prepared from packaged ready-to-toss greens... 3. Leftover foods are being prepared directly after a meal and packaged for freezing several days later... 10. Two kinds of ready-to-mix coffee are being used extensively for the club and church refreshment hour.

Answer: We presume you refer to Biscuit Tortoni or Macaroon Bombe.

- 1/2 cup crushed macaroon
1/2 cup icing sugar
1/2 cup milk
1 cup thick cream
1 tsp. almond extract
maraschino cherries
browned almonds

Combine macaroons, milk, icing sugar and a few grains of salt and let stand 1 hour. Whip 1 cup thick cream and fold into above mixture. Add flavoring and a few cut cherries. Place mixture in paper muffin cups in a refrigerator tray. Decorate with nuts and chill well for 3 hours.
