SPECIALISTS TO ASIA

Canada is sending four specialists in co-operative and agricultural training to report to the government on the technical assistance in these fields which Canada can usefully give to India, Pakistan and Ceylon. The visit of the mission to these countries is part of the help being given to Asian countries participating in the Colombo Plan.

The mission is being sent because of the emphasis placed on co-operatives and agricultural training in the first Indian Five Year Plan, in the report on the economic development of Ceylon prepared by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development and in the proposals for rural development made by the government of Pakistan.
