BOYNE FARM FORUM IS "TOPS" TO 30 WHO ENJOY DISCUSSIONS, EUCHE

Five Halton county farm forums entered the story of their forum in a competition recently. These are being published as they are interesting and informative. Last week the history of Rannock Burn farm forum was recalled, this week Boyne farm forum tell its story.

Boyne Farm Forum
Our farm forum is known as Boyne Farm Forum. It was organized in October 24, 1949, with the motto for organization going to Mr. Gordon Gray, then manager of The Milton District Co-operative, and Mrs. Denzil Lawrence, our first secretary, who guided the farm forum through the first year.

Since then, we have developed many customs which have become a part of our farm forum and serve to hold it together. Our discussions are lively, but we never allow them to become drawn out. A time is usually set for the discussion to end, and this tends to keep the discussion on the topic.

After the business meeting, we play euchre for an hour or more, and then lunch is served. We are usually home before midnight. We always meet in Boyne school house, unless we are invited elsewhere by a member of our farm forum, or by another forum. During the summer we continue our meetings, holding them at different homes once a month. Every summer we hold a full scale picnic. Last summer we held it at Victoria Park at Kitchener.

We have not allowed the farm forum to become political, but we do discuss our local problems, having two of our members in the township council.

On one occasion, in 1950, a delegation composed mainly of Boyne Farm Forum members, went to the Trafalgar Co-operative, in the township of the northern end of the township for an arena in Oakville, which, in all probability, we would never use. This brought results in our favor.

We always hold our election of officers in the spring to be ready for the next season. We elect men as president and vice president and a lady as secretary-treasurer.

Everyone is in the lunch committee, with a different group looking after it each evening. Every family contributes the prizes for euchre. We take up a collection each night, taking twenty five cents from each family.

We own six sturdy card tables and eight decks of cards. We also have a large coffee pot, and forty cups, and six card table covers. These have been made possible by our collections. We have held several parties, which were advertised. Each season we hold a picnic with 100-2000.

Don't get the idea that all our meetings are just a social get-together. We feel that it is the social aspect, however, that brings the people out. If it were not for the euchre part of the evening, coupled with the lunch, or if we spent hours in discussion, there would be very few who would attend. Our average attendance is thirty.

Each Christmas we put everyone's name in a hat and each person draws a name and buys a present (not exceeding fifty cents). This innovation adds fun and the Christmas spirit to the farm forum Christmas party.

We feel that the farm forum has brought a great deal more understanding to the members. We learn about the problems of different organizations and different parts of the country and we try to work out a settlement to these problems on our own farm forum.

The farm forum has meant a lot to the community. It has meant a night each week, to discuss our affairs, and to have a social evening. Yes, the forum has strengthened the community.

This is the story of our farm forum. We have told you, when it was organized, what customs we have developed, and what it means to the community. That is why some thirty people think Boyne Farm Forum is "tops."
