**Grand Union Buys Carroll Ltd. Chain**  
An American firm, the Grand Union Co. has bought Carrolls Limited, a chain of 31 grocery stores in Hamilton and the surrounding district.  
Founded by the late William Carroll of Hamilton in 1893, Carroll's was sold by the Carroll family to Montreal and Toronto interests in 1950 for more than \$750,000, but the name of the firm was retained. The amount of money involved in the latest sale has not been disclosed. M. R. Gilmore, of Toronto, and J. J. Block and Joseph Hompeyer, of Montreal, were owners of the chain for the past two and a half years.  
The acquisition of this Canadian chain marks the entry of the Grand Union Company into Canada, according to an announcement by Lansing P. Shields, president of the Grand Union Co. The second oldest and one of the major retail food chains in the United States, this chain operates 200 supermarkets and stores in six Eastern states, as well as home service routes in 30 states. In 1952, its sales exceeded \$104,000,000.  
The Grand Union Co. assumed active management of Carroll's on May 11.
