Plan For Garden Considers Shade

In laying out the vegetable garden plan it so that the tall plants such as corn stalks, tomatoes and pole beans will be at the north side where they will not cast shade on smaller plants.

To allow for cultivation, place asparagus, rhubarb and other perennial vegetables on the edge of the garden, about three feet from the grass line. Plant the vine crops in the centre of the garden, and the other crops on each side with two rows of early vegetables along the edges of the vine crops. These will be out of the way when the vine crops spread.

The square or nearly square garden is usually easier to handle than a long narrow one, if worked by hand. If a garden tractor is used, however, more headland space will have to be sacrificed and more turning is required. If possible, rotate the different plantings so that crops will not be on the same ground year after year, particularly cabbages and turnips, if club-root is to be kept in check. Onions and vine crops may be continued on the same soil year after year.

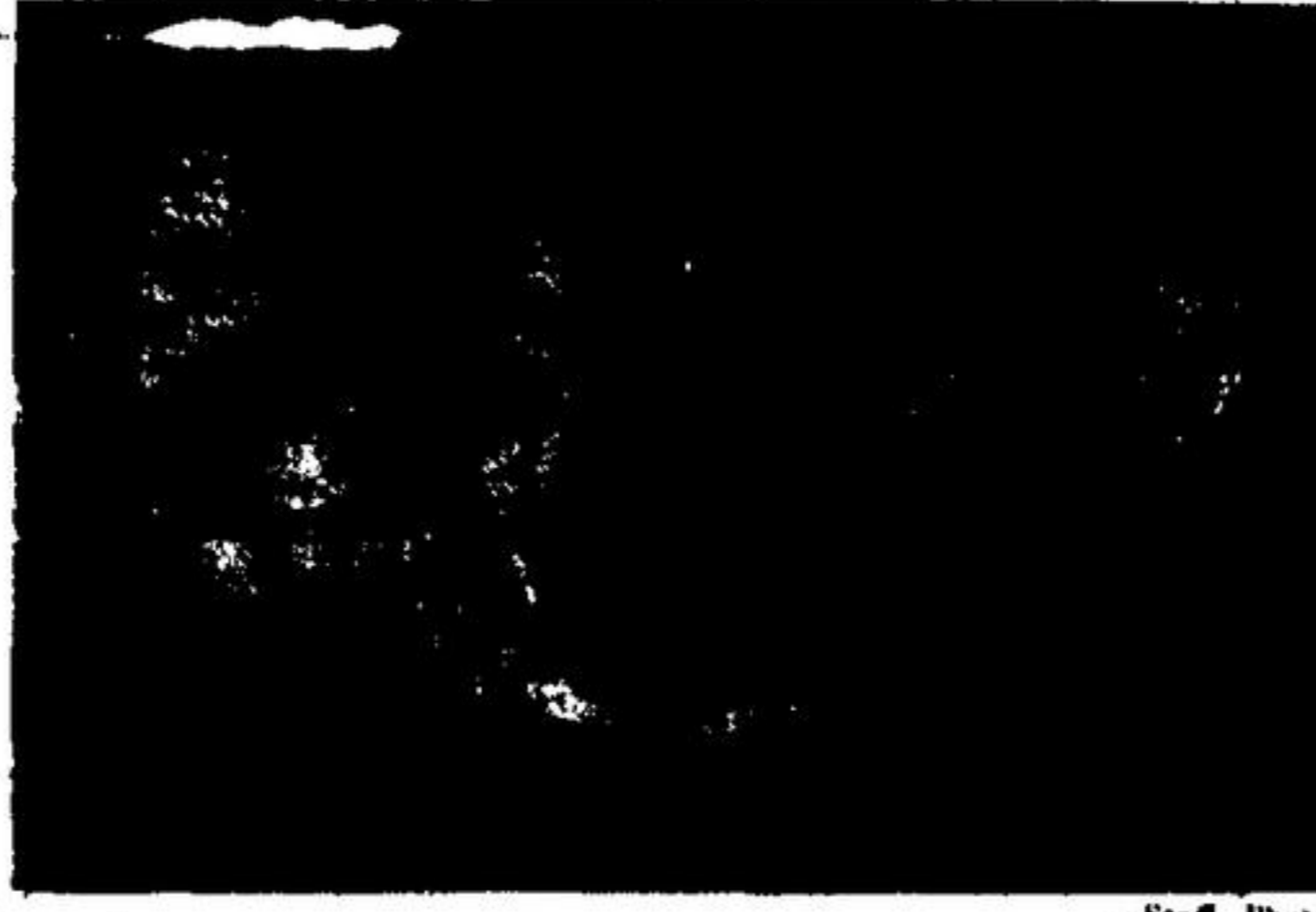
