Commercial Fishing Is Economic Asset

Commercial fisheries in Ontario constitute a quite considerable factor in the Provincial economy, judging by reports published by the Department of Lands and Forests. In a single year, they have netted 33,000,000 pounds of fish of various species valued at \$6,250,000. More than 90 per cent of it was for exportation.

Three species of fish accounted for almost two-thirds of the total catch: blue pickerel, at close to nine million pounds; and yellow pickerel in great quantities, just over three-and-a-half million; incidentally, almost the entire blue pickerel catch was taken from Lake Erie; only 54,000 pounds of this fish came from Lake Ontario.

Investments by commercial fishermen in nets, boats, freezers, ice houses, wharves, gear, etc., stand at approximately \$6,750,000, of which almost a third is represented by tug and gasoline launches. The industry pays wages to 3,886 men engaged in actual fishing operations, carried on under the authority of 1,856 commercial fishing licenses issued by the Fish and Wildlife Division of the Lands and Forests Department.
