HOLSTEIN BREEDERS HOLD TWILIGHT MEET

Hays Sales Arena on Friday evening was the scene of the twilight meeting staged by the Halton Holstein Breeders' Club. Well over 200 were in attendance for this annual event. Vice-president Gordon Sinclair presided over the very excellent program. The grading demonstration and competition was under the direction of Holstein fieldman George Drennan and Tom Hays.

The repartee between these two officials not only added zest to the meeting but helped to stress the points under discussion. The ladies prize in this competition was won by Mrs. H. B. Brown, and the men's prize by W. H. Robinson. No less than 18 of those present had a perfect score for classification.

NUTRITIONAL AUTHORITY

Dr. Hugh Branton, head of the Nutrition Department at the Ontario Agricultural College, was special speaker at the occasion. In dealing with minerals Dr. Branton stressed the importance of feeding minerals containing phosphorus, iodized salt and cobalt to all classes of cattle at all seasons of the year. In emphasizing the importance of good quality hay and pasture, Dr. Branton pointed out that most up-to-date pieces of machinery did not determine hay quality nor did chemical analysis, irrespective of the amount of protein, calcium and phosphorus revealed, determine palatability.

CROP PROSPECTS PROMISING

Halton countryside has seldom looked more promising than it does at the present time. In general, the meadows, pastures and fall wheat

are outstanding for the time year. In fact, some of the fall wheat is so heavy that areas here and there were rather badly lodged following last Thursday night's storm.

The spring grain is variable—the seedling season has stretched out over a period of at least six weeks. In fact, due to excess moisture conditions, a relatively small acreage is still unsown and will likely be sown to emergency crops such as buckwheat and millet. Here and there some fields have had to be re-sown—others patched.

Some of the earlier sown fields on the higher land are looking exceptionally good while on the heavier, more level land conditions are a bit patchy. Just how much damage has been done by last

Thursday evening's storm we are not sure at the moment, however, despite hailstorm, we are inclined to believe most sections of this county got off very lightly when compared to other areas in Western Ontario. Tomato plants and like crops were rather badly rattled here and there, windows were broken but in general we got off very lightly.

Health of Animals Branch officials are leaving no stone unturned to stamp out the hog cholera outbreak of last week. The one outbreak in Halton is reported to be at Campbellville here the operator or pig owner in question is reported to have purchased a few

While such action will not eliminate all disease carrying animals, it will at least provide some protection to purchasers and at the same time eliminate the more obvious carriers.

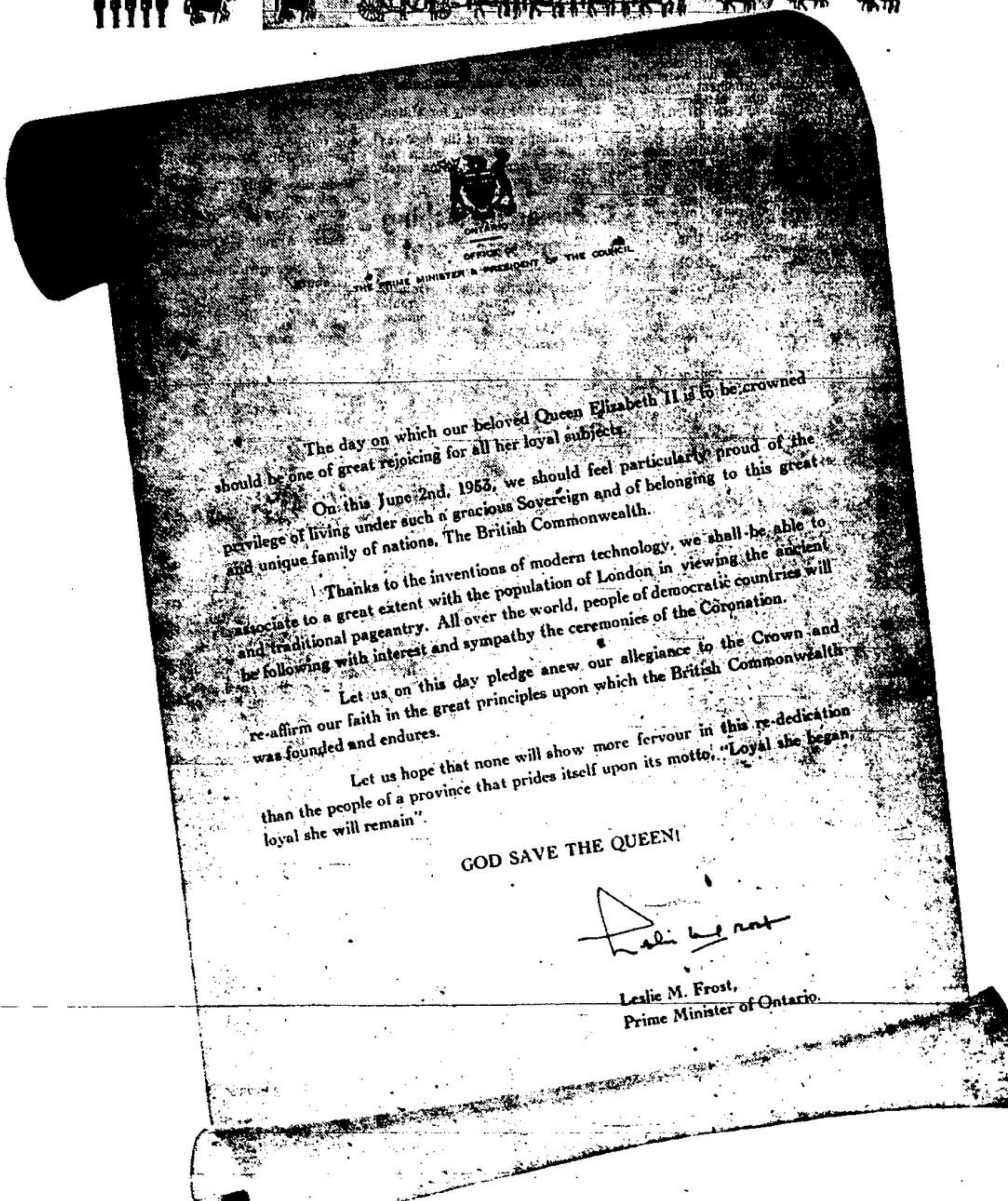
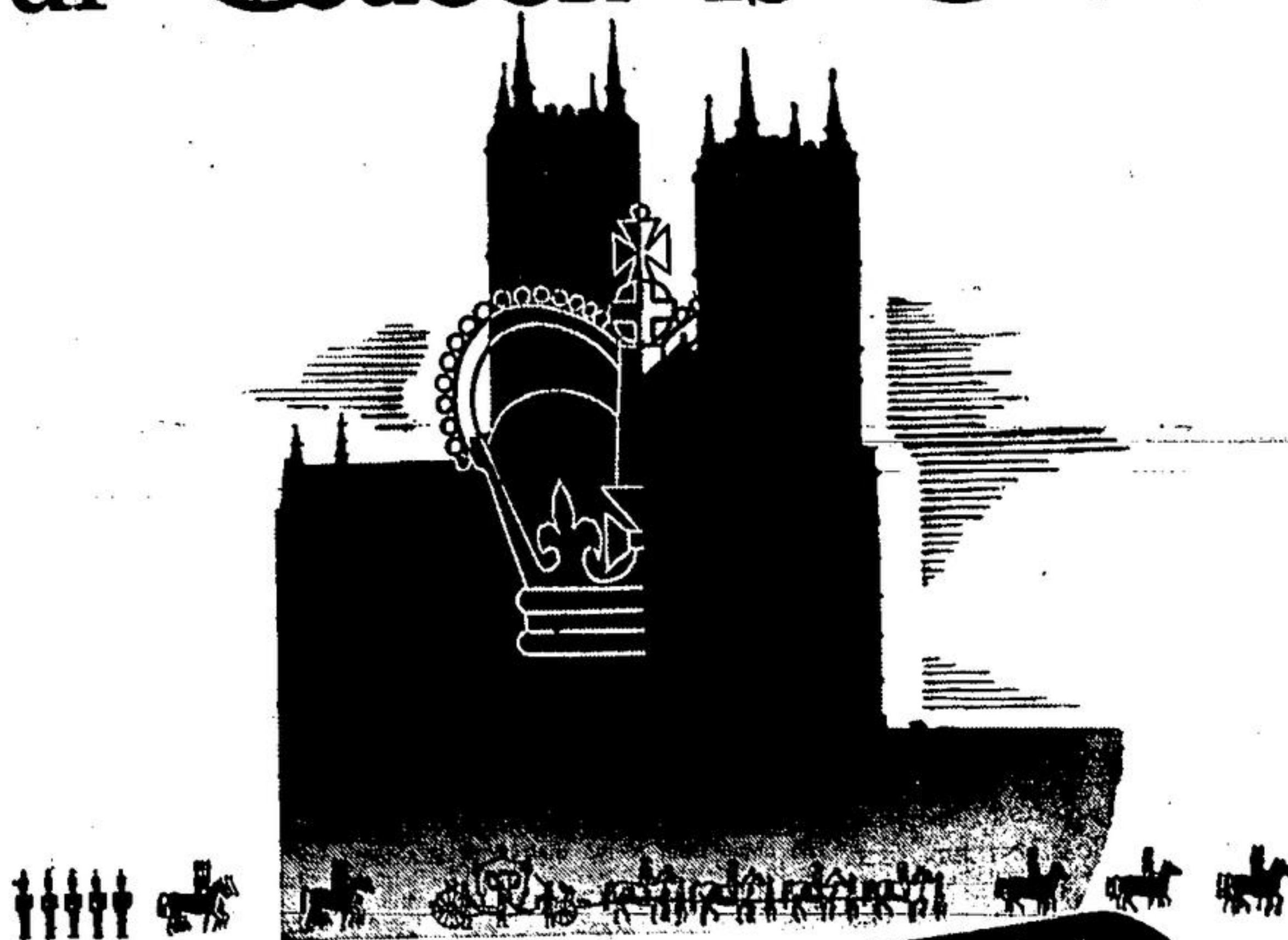
The National Anthem was sung and the Scripture lesson was read
