## Accident Victim Interred Monday

Funeral service was held on Monday, June 1, at the Victor B. Rumley funeral home for Robert Cyril Montague Ranney, who was killed in an accident at Scarborough on Saturday. Mr. Ranney, who was in his 32nd year, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Ranney of Arthur St., Acton. He was a radio technician with station CKEY.

Mr. Ranney is survived by his parents, a brother Keith and sister Lila.

He attended Acton high school, coming to Acton in 1937. Rev. Ralph Price conducted the funeral service which preceded interment in Fairview cemetery. Pallbearers were Ray Atkinson, Frank Wood, Ted Roadknight, David Nelles, Ralph Bludd and Bob Footitt.

The accident occurred in a driving rain storm early Saturday morning. The car in which Ranney was driving stalled helplessly on railroad tracks after carrying off a wigwag station on Eglington Ave. E. in Scarborough, and was struck by a speeding Montreal flyer.

The driver of the car, who was also killed, was Eric Hardwood of Highland Creek.

## Township History Recalls 130 Years

Another important contribution to the record of Canada was made recently when Frank Day issued his book, "Here and There in Eramosa." It's the history of a neighboring township and the 200 pages with maps and illustrations unfold the delightful early days of the township that boasted the Rockwood Academy with its famous scholars and other important events.

The author was well qualified to tell the story. A brief sketch of his background points out that although not a life-long resident of the area, he filled many municipal positions that brought him in constant contact with his subjects.

Sketches on the important centres in the township, including Everton, Rockwood, Bethel, Barrie Hill and many others, have been collected, along with information on pioneer families.

A historical work of this kind is not just put together overnight and the detail that is evident in the author traces early events indicates the amount of research and preparation that must have been poured into the book.

Copies of the book are available from Frank Day, Rockwood, at \$3. "My first municipal duty was that of Pathmaster under the Statute Labor Act, which meant the supervision of about two miles of road. A list of ratepayers on the 'beat' was sent to the pathmaster by the clerk, stating how many days' work should be performed by each. Eight hours was considered a day, and a man with a team and wagon was counted as three days. Gravel was usually hauled in June and despite the jibes and slurs usually connected with a charge of maladministration of the Statute Labor Act, there was very little difficulty in securing a good day's work at roadmaking from the neighbors on the 'beat.' That is the author's first experience in municipal work and emphasizes his background for compiling the history of Eramosa township.
