Equalization Provokes Battle

Council approved a resolution sponsored by the Burlington council to have the Department of Highways approve a 15 mile-per-hour speed limit imposed in school areas.

Reeve Shannon said the resolution was being sent to all councils for their approval. He said his council deemed it necessary as three or four children had been injured by passing motorists in the Burlington and Aldershot areas within the past few months.

Council accepted a petition from the Kilbride school area ratepayers, to have a board of arbitration hear their appeal for withdrawing from the Nelson school area. Similar appeals are now being heard from Bell's and Zimmerman school area ratepayers, and council agreed by resolution that the present Board of Arbitration should hear the Kilbride appeal. The appeal was launched after Nelson Township council declined approving the ratepayer's request for withdrawal.

George E. Elliott, Milton, appeared on behalf of the petitioners. Deputy Reeve John Atkins, Nelson, informed members his council would be satisfied if the present board of arbitration would hear the case.

A tender of Jones and Van Gils, Acton, for the erection of a concrete vault at the county buildings was accepted at a cost of \$3,280.

Two applications for the establishment of wrecking and salvage yards were presented; applicants being A. Brown, highway 7, west of Georgetown and a second by D. Mather on the 8th line, Trafalgar township. Reeve L. McArthur, of Oakville, pointed out there was a wrecking yard on Highway 25 which is an eyesore and a disgrace. I would recommend that no further licenses be issued until they are properly fenced.

In connection with the Mather application it was to be forwarded to Trafalgar township council to see if it came under zoning regulations. As the Brown application had been doing business at the present site, the matter was left in the hands of Deputy Reeve W. Bird and police to make a report. If the report is favorable, and the site properly fenced, license will be issued.

Accounts approved and ordered to be paid included: county buildings, \$86.49; finance, \$2,779.27; county roads, \$18,476.84; printing, \$345.81; hospitals, \$1,729.10; agriculture and reforestation, \$676.50; Centennial Manor, \$496; assessment, \$263.25.
