WALLACEBURG WALLOPS RAMS SAT. INDIANS TAKE MEASURE LAST NIGHT

After suffering two defeats, at the hands of Wallaceburg and the Inchoqua Indians respectively, Acton Rams will be going full tilt at the arena on Saturday night when they meet Georgetown N. A. O's and again on Wednesday when Wallaceburg makes a return visit here. The two defeats absorbed this week dropped the Rams a notch in the standing with Sarnia wallopping Georgetown to stay at the head of the class. The Rams have now racked up six wins and lost three.

Only penalties played an important part in a 22-10 loss the Rams absorbed in Wallaceburg last Saturday night after making the long jump in intense heat to the border town. One sentence was even handed to Norm Young, which he was compelled to serve, while John Krapak went in the nets without the goalie's participation to stem the attack while he was off with Larry Tallefer already sitting out a 10 minute penalty for some misadventure to one yet has been able to figure out. "We've been trying for years to beat that Sarnia team and you beat them the first time," the Wallaceburg players remarked after the game. "Now we beat you. How come?" Acton officials were reticent. They preferred to let the next meeting of the two clubs next Wednesday night speak for itself.

Doug Smith and Jack Mann led the Acton scoring with three goals apiece, Mann also chalking up an assist while Burton, Avery, Revie, Bennett and Krapak chalked up singles. Tallefer and Avery were in on the brackets also.

For Wallaceburg, Mathe with six goals was the leading scorer while Howell potted four. Howell and Bill Bennett were given match penalties at the end of the third period for fighting. There were 23 sentences imposed by the referees.
