Ball Fan, A. Adams Dies in 67th Year

After living in the Acton district four years, Augustus Adams of R.R. 1 passed away on June 23 at his home, following a heart seizure. He was in his 67th year.

Born in Newport, Monmouthshire, England, he came to Canada in 1913. He lived at Guelph for 20 years, for four years at Fergus and two years in the Oakville district. Mr. Adams followed all the rural ball games and sponsored a ball team while living at Guelph, where he operated a dairy business for 13 years.

Mr. Adams was married in 1909 to Sarah Matilda Lewis, who survives him. Four daughters and one son, Phyllis (Mrs. Gordon Blacklock), Eden Mills, Melville, Campbellville; Velma (Mrs. Ken Ellis), Rockwood; Ivy (Mrs. William Ritchie), Rockwood; and May (Mrs. Fred Laing), Moffat; brothers Walter, Vancouver, B.C.; Albert and Fred and sisters Minnie (Mrs. Webb), Edith (Mrs. Frank Bodman) in Monmouthshire, England; and 11 grandchildren, also remain. Four brothers and two sisters predeceased him.

He was a member of the Anglican Church, Rev. R. Price of Acton officiated at the funeral service, which was held at the Victor B. Rumley funeral home in Acton on June 27. Rev. Maxwell of Hornby assisted.
