committee was to be arranged regarding insurance coverage on the town hall contents and fire truck coverage.

Council refused payment of \$1,200 to remove the high tension power line crossing leased public school playground area. Explaining refusal of the payment, council felt they should not pay for moving the poles, since they are on privately owned property leased to the school board on a short term lease.

Councillor Tyler pointed out that with the removal of high school pupils from that area, more playground space would be available for the public school students away from the power line.

The assessment of the recently purchased high school site was written off since school property is not taxable.

The Public Utilities Commission was asked to continue the street lighting service on Mill St. East and Acton Blvd.

Application is to be made to the Toronto division of the Department of Highways to erect a sign pointing to Acton on the Queen-Elizabeth Way at Bronte.

The pedestrian sign on the Cemetery Hill at the entrance to town is to be replaced. It was broken shortly after being erected.

A letter from the C.N.R., the office of the superintendent, explained the town was within its rights restricting the load limit on the Maria St. bridge. He explained that if the plank was replaced, the bridge would be good for another five years. He also pointed out the bridge was not built for present day traffic.

Erosion of the swimming beach at Prospect Park came in for serious consideration as council expressed alarm at the gradual narrowing of the beach. The town foreman was instructed to try and remedy the situation with poles or railway ties.

A letter was directed to county council explaining that possibly the supervision at the Halton Centennial Manor was not adequate at all times.

Civic Holiday was proclaimed for August 3 and no council meeting will be held until August 17 unless an emergency meeting is required.

Reeve J. Stewart reported the county would be hard topping Main St. north of the track. This is a county connecting link and is maintained by the county under an agreement with the town.

It was reported that the town percentage on lacrosse games had not been paid regularly. Arrangements were made to have these payments brought up to date.
