**INDIANS MEET RAMS IN PLAY-OFFS,  
ACTON BACK AT FULL STRENGTH**

Increasing interest by players and fans alike has hung an air of expectancy over the start of the lacrosse play-offs here on Saturday when the Rams meet the Iroquois Indians in the first game of a four out of seven series.

The Indians improved so much in the later stages of the schedule by adding new men from the other end of the reservation, the home of the well-built Mohawks, that veteran lacrosse observers are mentioning them as possible champions. During the schedule they took three out of four meetings with Acton and scared the daylight out of the high teams on the totem pole on more than one occasion with their spirited drive.

The Rams, considered one of the best teams in the league when at full strength, are not expecting any push-over at the expense of the Iroquois. They held a practice last night with a good turn-out, appointed a manager and prepared for what looks like a gruelling series.

The new manager is Ollie Burton, an uncle of high scoring Gordie Burton of the Rams and a veteran at the lacrosse game. In addition to other capacities, he has been a member of the 1930-31 Brampton Excelsiors who brought home the Canadian championship that year. He has a sound knowledge of the game and hopes to whip the Rams into good shape for this important play-off.

With holidays over and various other excuses for not appearing in uniform all being accounted for, there is no reason why the Rams should not have a full team on hand for the play-offs. Krapek, Revis Bennett, Harold Avery and Ken Woods have all finished their holidays and were out for practice last night. Huck O'Connell is about the only player who won't be putting in an appearance. He's playing football for the new Kitchener-Waterloo entry in the O.R.F.U. and that demands all his time.

Vendetta at Sarnia

Last Saturday at Sarnia, the Acton team absorbed a 17-3 defeat in a vendetta that had even the Sarnia fans jeering the referees—two home town boys—for their interpretation of the rules. The Rams went ahead 2-0 on goals by Gordie Burton in the first quarter but ended the stanza behind 3-2.
