If You Can Walk You Can Water Ski

Most people have seen pictures of beautiful gals and lithe young men skimming over the waves on skis. But too few people realize that water skiing like winter skiing, is a recreation more than a competitive sport. Not more than five to eight per cent of snow skiers are competitors and there will be even less on the water. If you can walk you can ski in the winter and you don't even have to be a swimmer for water skiing—a Mac West will hold you up.

Water skis are more like the original winter skis of thousands of years ago than the streamlined winter models of today. Like the old time skis they are usually made of ash but sometimes heavier woods are used in plywood construction. Starting off on water skis is the only tough part to straight skiing the experts say. Usually the skier straightens up too fast the first time and finishes 10 feet from the dock flat on his face. The best way to start alone is from a sitting position on a dock about six to 10 inches above water line. Knees are bent with the feet and tails of the skis under water. Tips are out and skis are in a slight snow plow position.

You don't need the best equipment in order to water ski. It is easy to bend up your own pieces of ash. Old running shoes with laces of rubber or something that will break easily will hold you or Water and skiing are here to stay!
