

GOAL-KEEPER SPARKLES IN 3-2 WIN BY GEORGETOWN AT 'FITBA' MATCH

Georgetown's snappy little Wolves pulled a surprise by shaming the Acton soccer club 3-2 in a twilight game here last Friday night. It was the third meeting between the two clubs this season, each team having one win in previous appearances. It was a nip and tuck battle all the way with Acton team sparked by Les Davies' booming punts from back on guard, having more than their share of the play. They kept the ball continually driving at the Wolves' goal but met more than their match from the Georgetown goal keeper who was little short of sensational at stopping kicks that were labelled. He had two or three Acton players on his doorstep on four or five occasions with only the red jacketed goalie to beat but he dived into the fray with such authority and emerged clutching the ball so often he disorganized the Acton marksmen around the net.

The Georgetown team, well coached play a positional game that kept the heavier and more rugged Acton players on the hop.

The locals spotted Georgetown a goal in the first half before a well placed kick from close in scored to tie the game up. Then a new face culminated a nice play with a boot between the posts to put Acton ahead early in the second half. However, when the local defense bogged down, the Wolves succeeded in tying the score. And with only 10 minutes remaining in the game, Georgetown scored another to wrap it up although they had some anxious moments in the last few minutes as the Acton club drove through to the goal several times.

The Acton team was missing at least three regulars in Cliff Sutton, Al Spanton and Jack Calder, who has been a tower of strength in goal for the locals.

About 200 fans attended the game.

Rams Rattle In 28 Goals, 3-Up on Boxla Series

After last night's game which saw the Rams chalk up a lopsided 28-11 victory over the hapless Iroquois Indians to take their third straight win in the best-of-seven group semifinals, only one more victory is needed to sew the series up for Acton. The win could come on Friday night in Caledonia when the series resumes on the Indians' own stamping grounds.

If a fifth game is necessary, it will be played in Acton next Wednesday night.

The Rams were never behind as Lloyd Smith set the pattern with a goal in the early minutes last night, one of nine goals and four assists he was to score during the game. The Iroquois, short-handed again, kept up the pace for the first half which ended 12-7, but wilted in the last two quarters as the Acton players turned it on good and fattened their scoring averages. Scores by periods were 6-3, 12-7, 22-8 and finally 28-11.

Nearly every player on the Acton team got into the scoring column, with net-minder Norm Young trying for a goal in the final minute as well. The big gun, of course, was Lloyd Smith with his nine goals and four assists, which must set a new scoring record for the Acton team this season. Burton's ten goal performance at Wallaceburg is the only goal scoring picnic to eclipse it.

"Smitty" teamed up with linemates Jack Mann and Ken Watkins for a total of 14 goals and 10 assists. The trio made a pretty combination and Thomas, the Indian twine tender, had his hands full as they whipped the ball back and forth around the net. Watkins added in two goals and assisted on four while Mann sniped three markers and collected two assists.

Gordie Burton was also on his bicycle with six goals, John Krapek pumped in four and while Revis Bennett only lit the lamp once, he assisted on five goals for a total of six points.

Other scorers were Harold Avery

with two and an assist, Ken Woods with a goal and three assists and Doug Smith, Chuck Mast and Joe Gerrie each with an assist.

For the Indians, Joe Martin with five goals and an assist played a bang-up game. H. Martin pumped in four goals and Bomberry and Peters each got one to round out the scoring.

Only two penalties were handed out by the referees who had little work to do other than keeping track of goals.

ACTON 10-IROQUOIS 9

The Iroquois gave Acton a real battle in the second game of the series last Saturday night in Caledonia with the biggest crowd they have attracted this year watching. They played it right down to the wire before the Indians conceded defeat by a 10-9 score. Acton had to come from behind to tie it up late in the game and the winning goal was scored by Lloyd Smith with only a minute of play left.

Smith's goal broke the hearts of the Iroquois who played a rugged brand of lacrosse in an attempt to deadlock the series. Both teams traded checks until the referees felt Jack Mann of the Rams General and Bomberry of the Iroquois should be thrown out for fighting, which took place promptly and without much ceremony. Only Acton usually has Larry Taillefer who injured his shoulder in a tiff along the boards, putting him on the shelf for a few games at least.

Although he wasn't in the scoring column too often, Joe Gerrie played one of the finest games he has ever played in Acton history, both defensively and on the attack. His vigorous defense chore kept the Rams in there when the going got tough. Johnny Krapek was top hand in the goal scoring department with three. Jack Mann got two as did Lloyd Smith, while Joe Gerrie, Rev Bennett and Doug Smith each lit the mazdas once.

Leaves For Scotland To Play Pro Hockey

A local lacrosse and hockey star, Freddie Kentner was chosen from among 74 players invited to the training camp to play hockey in the British Isles this year. He will play in the Scottish League, probably on a Glasgow team.

He left last Thursday on a liner and will arrive sometime this week. The team will work into condition and then go on a tour of the continent that includes Belgium, Holland, France and Switzerland in its itinerary.

Freddie was with Parry Sound Shamrocks last season after playing earlier with Mahers in the T.H.L. major series. He left Mahers with the intention of going to Scotland but Canadian Amateur Hockey Association regulations prohibited more than two players from one team leaving the country, and the Maher net minder had left earlier. He signed with Parry Sound when this ruling was enforced.

The year previous Kentner did a stint with Washington Lions in the United States. When they folded up he finished the season in Toronto with Mahers. He has also played hockey with Milton Co-ops and Acton Juniors in his career which started a few years ago on Acton minor teams where he was always a star performer.

In addition to his hockey career, Freddie Kentner has also carved out a niche in lacrosse, which he played for the first time last year with the now defunct Acton B-Hives. His game has always been aggressive and this year he has been a valuable defenseman on the Rams. He will be missed from the Acton line-up.

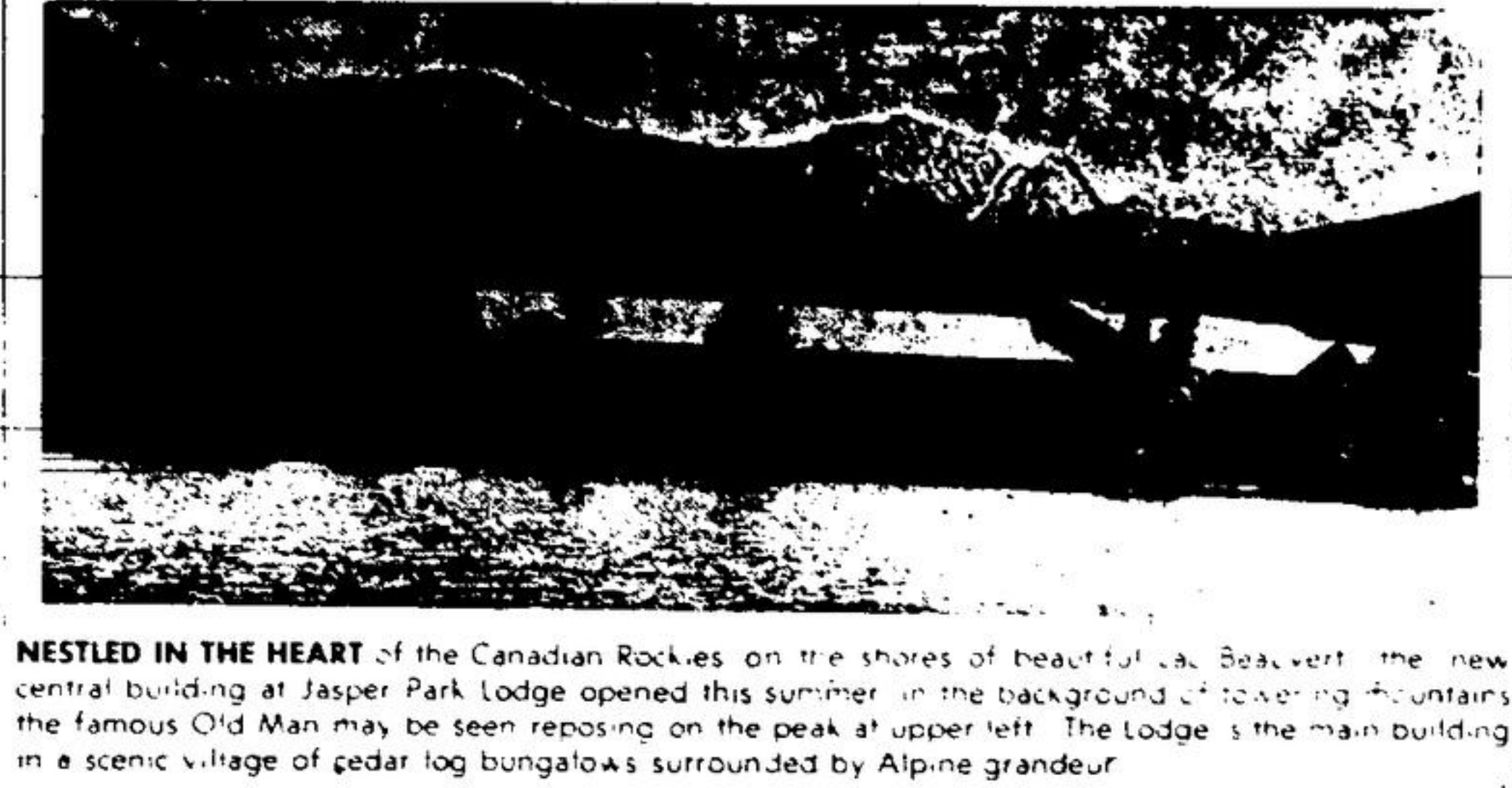
