Rams Eliminate Iroquois Meet Streetsville Next

"We should have won it in four games," said an official of the lacrosse club last night as the Rams finally disposed of the pestiferous Iroquois Indians in the group semi-finals. A lot of fans and spectators must have had identical thoughts because they stayed away in droves as the Rams walloped the Indians 15-7 in the fifth game of the best-of-seven to wrap up the series four games to one.

The Rams suffered a reverse last Friday night when some surprisingly stiff opposition from the Iroquois set them back on their respective buttocks by an 18-10 score making a fifth game necessary. It looked for a while as if the Indians were going to repeat their feat of Friday as they led 2-0 at the end of the first quarter, and 4-3 at the half, but the Acton club piled up nine goals in the third chapter last night to win going away.

The Rams meet Streetsville next in the group finals. Streetsville disposed of London in four straight games in the other intermediate semi-final series. First game of the finals will be held in Acton on Saturday night.

Thomas, the Indians' net minder, once a pro with Vancouver on the west coast, posed a real problem for the Rams last night as he withstood assault after assault in the first quarter. He blanked Acton in that chapter while his mates put two past Norm Young, who also had to be sharp.

Doug Smith put Acton back in the game in the second quarter as he literally threaded the needle for a goal from close in after the Indians stretched their lead to 3-0. Longboat added another for the Indians before first Revis Bennett, and then Gordie Burton, scored unassisted goals to pull the Rams to within one goal of the leaders.

The Indians, checking like fiends with spurs on the bench, deserved a 4-3 lead at the end of the first half. Thomas was nearly unbeatable in the nets and he robbed the Rams every time with his exhibition of goal tending.

Ollie Burton must have given the Rams the formula during the intermission. The three musketeers, Jack Mann, Lloyd Smith and Ken Watkins, couldn't seem to get unravelled in the first half, but they came out in the third chapter to start an onslaught that proved to be the winning margin. Mann put Acton back on even terms for the first time in the game in the early minutes on a pass from Watkins, and he duplicated his feat by grabbing a loose ball in front of the net and slamming it home before Thomas could make a move, putting Acton ahead for the first time. The lead was shortlived, however, as Bomber who along with Jim Martin, was top hand for the Iroquois, sided in and blasted another past Young to deadlock the count.

It took several minutes before the Rams could regain the lead. Ken

Woods supplied the spark by taking a pass from Revis Bennett to put Acton ahead for the second time. It wasn't long until Ken Watkins had Jack Mann set up twice in front of the net and Mann made no mistake with his shots. From that point on, it was strictly an Acton show.

Mann and Watkins were tops in the goal scoring department with 13 points between them consisting of six goals and seven assists. Mann sank five goals while Watkins potted one and chalked up six assists.

Doug and Lloyd Smith and Ken Woods contributed a pair each with Revis Bennett, Bill Bennett and Gordie Burton sniping singles. Rev. Bennett also got an assist as did Lloyd Smith, Harold Avery and Joe Gerrie.

For the Iroquois, Jim Martin with four goals was the leading scorer, followed by F. Hill, Longboat and Bomber with one apiece.

Only five penalties were handed out, three of them to Acton.

Scaupled at Caledonia, the Rams were an easy mark for a rejuvenated band of Indians last Friday. The Indians thrilled their biggest home crowd of the year by pumping 18 past Norm Young while Acton got back 10.

The game was close in the first half but the Iroquois, who have plenty of foot when they want to show it, were full value for the win. Burton, although he wasn't feeling well, was top hand for Acton with four goals while Revis Bennett, Harold Avery and Joe Gerrie each rapped in two.

Rev. Bennett and the ref had a brief argument after a row in the penalty box which resulted in his ejection from the game. The ref took exception to a poke Bennett aimed at him and let fly with one in return.
