EMPHASIS ON ADULTS IN PROGRAM THIS YEAR, Y.M.C.A. BOARD TOLD

Stress will be laid on adult sports and educational program and on team sports for both boys and girls this coming season at the Y.M.C.A., a schedule drafted by the program committee reveals. The Y Board heartily approved the plans at a board meeting on September 14. Members of the program committee, with the new Y secretary D. H. Schull, are Ken Allen, Lorne Garner and John Miles.

With the widely-experienced Mr. Schull directing activities and giving most of the instruction himself, the Y board is anticipating a record-smashing year. Emphasis on adult participation in the Y activities includes badminton, basketball, volleyball and table tennis plans. Mr. Schull is particularly expert at basketball and volleyball, having introduced volleyball to his native Holland and judged basketball at Olympics. He is also a specialist in ladies' rhythmic gymnastics, which he hopes to teach here.

Contacts have already been made with Guelph, Toronto, Kitchener

and Galt for inter-Y basketball games when Acton has formed a team. Swimming classes will again be held in Guelph and a possibility of a summer camp is already considered. Phalanx club, junior arts and crafts, parents' night and a gymboree were also reported as on the year's agenda.

With Junior and bantam programs after school, the evening at the Y will be reserved for adults and intermediates, the board has agreed.

Saturday night So-Ed programs once a month will include a talk or film, hobby or interest groups and social time. Speakers will be specialists including the new Y secretary.

A series of talks and concerts for the adult Y members was also reported by the program committee. Once a month there will be a Saturday open house, they planned.

Card room and the lounge will both be available for recreation, while a remodelling of the Y has created another meeting room upstairs.

Mrs. Schull plans to help with the nursery school in the Y. She is an expert on gymnastics for very young children.

Colored pictures a talk by Mr. Schull and refreshments were decided as the program for the opening night early in October.

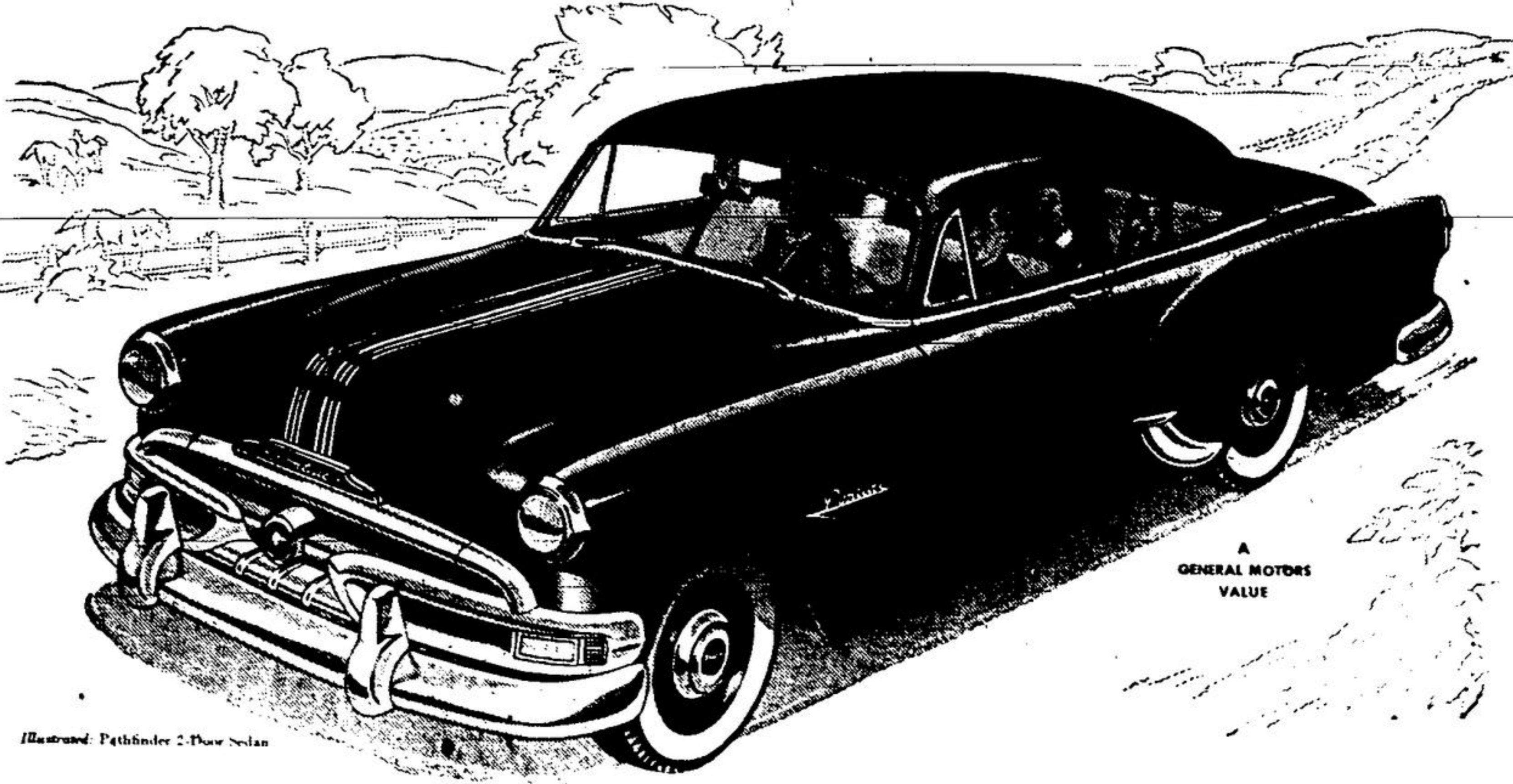
