Many Actonians still recall when the Force, on a march from Camp Borden to Hamilton, spent a night quartered in Acton. After spending the winter at Hamilton, the soldiers went overseas in the spring of 1917.

The oldest attending was Sgt. Phil Gee, 76, who was in charge of the bugle band. The original Regimental Sergeant Major acted as master of ceremonies.

The 164th's Sergeant's Mess Association was formed in 1928 ten years after the armistice was signed.
