From Halton's Farm Lands

Halton's famed dairy cattle show, held in conjunction with the Milton Fair, on September 28th, while down in numbers, was still an outstanding success. A total of 327 entries were made in the Holstein, Jersey and Guernsey shows.

While not the largest from the standpoint of numbers, in the opinion of many on the ringside, the Jersey show stole the laurels from the standpoint of high quality. According to a veteran Jersey authority, there were "twice as many good Jerseys at Milton, as at the Central Canada Exhibition in Ottawa in August, despite the fact that there was a hundred more Jerseys at Ottawa than were at Milton."

The official judges in the three rings were as follows: Holsteins—D. S. Dunton, prominent Holstein breeder of Peel County; Guernseys—Adam Calder, of Glanford Station and in the Jersey ring — Oswald Warman, of Brampton.

Jersey Show
Maurice C. Beatty's Lindale herd again won the Premier Exhibitor honors, and also had both the Junior and Reserve Junior championships in females, as well as the Reserve Junior champion male.

Gerald R. Graham, of Ashgrove, had both the Grand Champion female, and also the winning herd. The Reserve Grand championship for females went to Featherstone Bros., of Oakville.

In the male classes, the Reserve Junior championship went to the important sire of "Reserve" registered of Georgetown, and the Reserve Grand champion males, to Featherstone Bros.

President Ken Ella of the Halton club took the red ribbons for both milking 2 year olds and dry 2 year olds, and Mac Alexander the red ribbon for Junior Bull Calves.

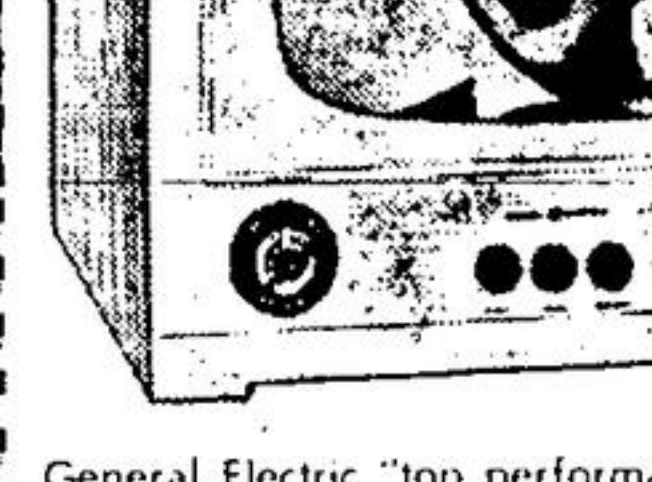

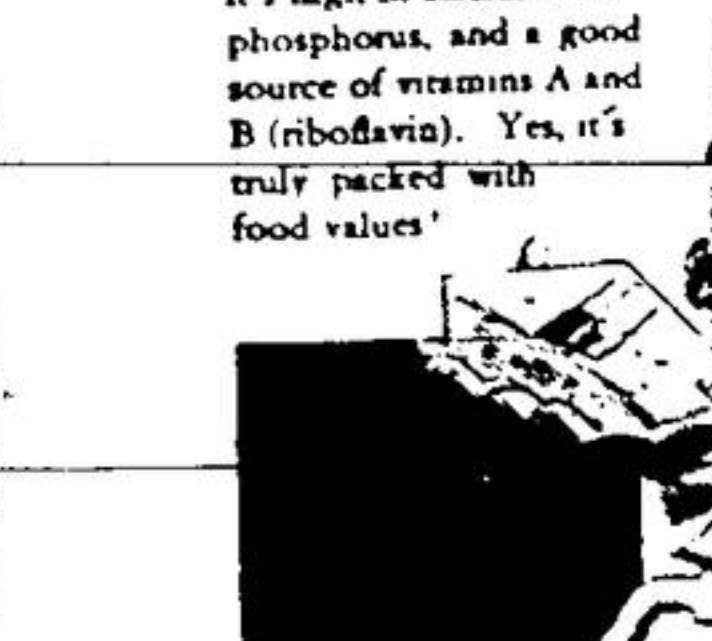
In the female classes, Ross Segsworth was again to the front, winning the Junior Championship for females—the Reserve going to T. H. McGee of Norval.
