## TALES ON TINTYPES



Although we have no data recorded by A. T. Brown on the above picture we believe it shows the installation of the bell for the clock on the post office tower which was installed shortly after its erection in 1913. When we first looked at this picture we thought it was one of the old bell on the town hall.

We are not sure who the workman is adjusting the stalling apparatus but it looks like George

King who was for some years in charge of hydro in Acton. But we may be mistaken and we'll be glad to hear from George who now resides at Massey, Ont., if our identification is in error.

The other four men will be readily recognized by residents of 40 years ago. At the extreme right is Norman McLeod who was in charge of J. B. Mackenzie's Acton plant and no doubt built the structure for the bell. Next

is Jim Anderson who was first caretaker of the post office building and held the position until his death. Geo. Hynds, a reeve of Acton and who had care of the clock, is shown with his hand on the structure and at the left is Chester Plank, well-known for years in Acton. All of the four men standing have since passed away.

## WORLD CHAMPION PLOWMEN TO GO THROUGH TOWN DURING ONT. TOUR

The champion plowmen of nine European countries, and possibly the Canadian and U.S. champions, who will be competing in the first world tractor plowing match at Coburg today and tomorrow, October 8 and 9, will have a look at our community this month. Their visits at different Ontario centres are part of a special tour arranged to show interesting urban and rural aspects of Canadian life.

During their stay in Canada the overseas teams will attend many events in their honor, as well as seeing the Ontario and Quebec countryside. During this two weeks' tour, during which the world's top plowmen will pass through town, they will visit the Six Nations reserve at Brantford where Mr. Hall will be made an honorary Indian chief.

On Thanksgiving Day, next Monday, the group will leave Niagara Falls, pass through Hamilton, Milton and Acton enroute to Erin Agricultural fair. The plowmen are guests of the Erin agricultural society at luncheon.

From there they travel to Waterloo, Kitchener, Brantford and Guelph. On Wednesday of next week the visitors will again pass through Acton on their way to Toronto.

Altogether 11 countries will compete, with countries represented Denmark, Norway, Finland, Great Britain, Germany, Holland, Northern Ireland, Republic of Ireland, Sweden, the United States and Canada.

The Ezzo Golden Plow trophy, emblematic of world plowing supremacy, was brought to Canada by Alfred Hall, England, secretary of the World Championship Ploughing Organisation. It is a replica in miniature of the Norfolk plow, which was in common use in the early 18th century and is the forerunner of nearly all modern plows.

### Industry Develops Fire Danger Upped

These new developments are also accompanied with a continually increasing risk of fire and accident hazard and this factor is of the utmost importance.

Fire losses continue to grow and unfortunately Canada has the unenviable record of having one of the highest per capita loss records. It must be remembered that Fire Losses consist not only of the direct loss of buildings, machinery and contents, but loss of life and injuries to hundreds of Canadians every year. Further, the closing of premises damaged or destroyed by fire affects the population; men and women are thrown out of jobs until such time as the premises are rebuilt and ready for production of goods.

It is well known from statistics that the major cause of fires is carelessness. If every Canadian exercised more care, fire losses would diminish and millions of dollars would be saved to pay nothing of the lives and injuries suffered by countless persons every year.
