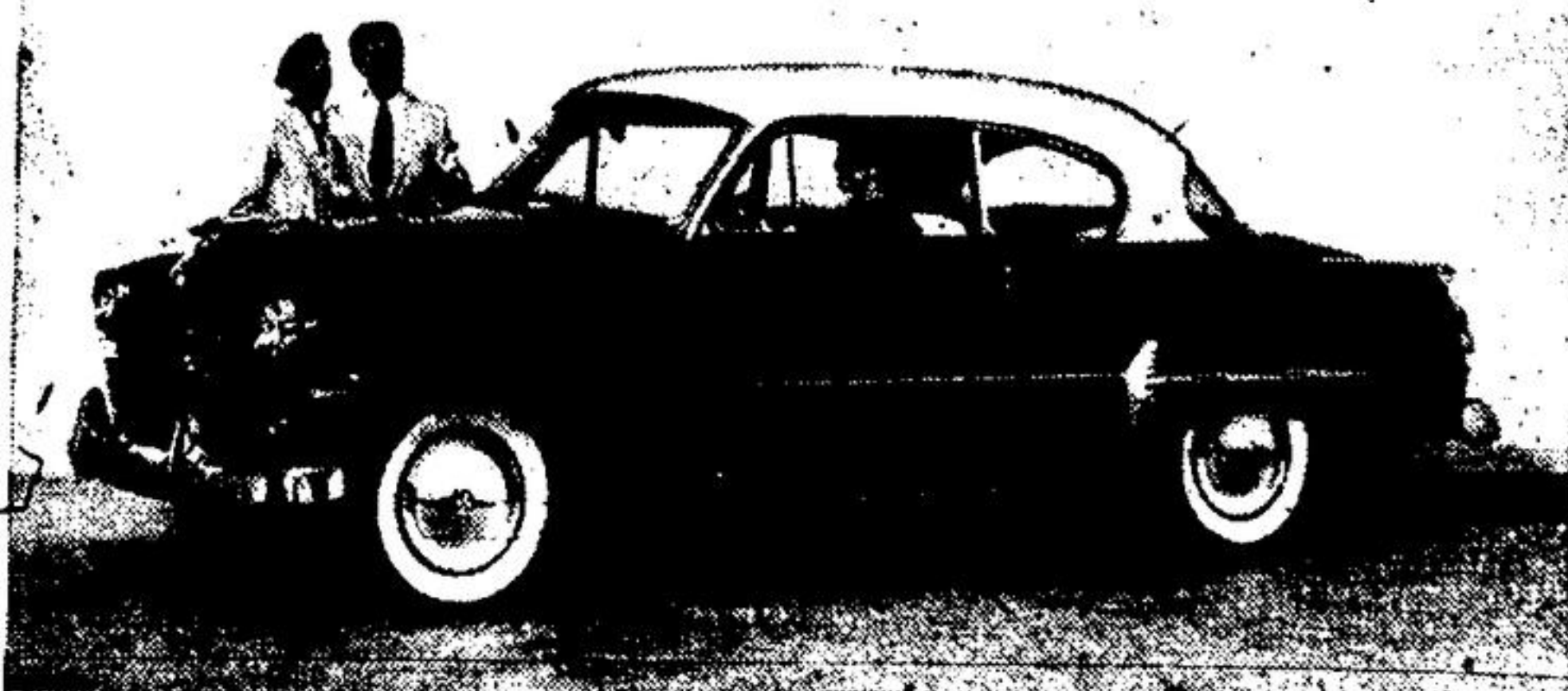


THE BELVEDERE IS STYLE LEADER OF 1954 PLYMOUTH

Popcorn Balls
3 qts. popped corn
1 cup granulated sugar
1 cup corn syrup
1 cup water
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla

Cook sugar, syrup and water to a medium candy stage (until it threads about 200 degs. Add flavoring and salt, pour over the corn stirring with a spoon. Shape the mixture into balls, lay on a waxed paper and wrap in cellophane.

Candied Apples
2 cups sugar
1 cup water
1 tsp. cream of tartar
4 drops of lemon juice
12 to 14 snow apples

side, drain on absorbent paper. May coat with creamy cookie icing. Yield 2 dozen.

THE QUESTION BOX

Mrs. R. F. asks: What precautions can we take to prevent fruit pies from boiling over?

Answer: (1) Place fruit pies on the fourth or fifth shelf in your oven at a preheated temperature of 450 degrees for 10 minutes only, then reset the oven dial to 350 degs. for 40 to 45 minutes. (2) If you cut butter wrapping paper in four strips then wet it and place around the rim of the pie plate to cover the edge of the pastry, overlapping each piece one inch, this will prevent the juice from boiling out in the oven.

Mrs. F. B. asks: How can we prevent the last batch of cookies from burning on the bottom even though a previous filled cookie sheet did not burn?

Answer: If you are only baking five or six cookies it is wise to place them on an inverted pie plate in preference to the large cookie sheet. Never use a deep sided pan in place of a cookie sheet.

Miss A. G. asks: How can we tell how long to cook beets in a pressure cooker (whole skin on)?

Answer: Usually medium sized beets require 12 minutes in a pressure cooker. If they are larger than a half cup size it is wise to cut them to this size even though they are not sealed, since they will not bleed while being cooked in a pressure cooker.

To Seek New Home Parish Reorganizes For Temporary Care Holy Name Society

The Reception Home Committee of the Children's Aid Society and superintendent G. F. Thompson are to take steps to procure another home for the temporary care of children. It was decided at the October board meeting of the society held at the office in Milton on October 13. For some time the Society has had the use of Mrs. David Clarke's home near Milton, but at this meeting Mrs. Clarke's letter of resignation, to become effective December 31, 1953, was presented.

Mrs. W. A. Weaver of Burlington president presided. The following board members were in attendance: Mrs. W. A. Weaver, Mrs. Louis J. Lee, Mrs. Velma Norris, Mrs. M. J. Brown, Mrs. Orland E. Robbins, J. W. Higgins, C. R. Anderson, J. Murray Mahon, Wm. Deane, W. G. MacKenzie, Robinson, Dr. H. V. Cranfield and G. F. Thompson, superintendent.

Accounts for the month of September, amounting to \$1566.52 were passed for payment. The activities of the Society for the month of September showed the following statistics: 11 new cases and 2 re-opened in the Child Protection Department; a total of 62 cases open at the end of the month, with 71 visits. There were 117 children in care in the various categories. 33 Society wards in paid boarding care; 100 visits were paid to children in care and there were 2 new unmarried parent cases.

It was decided to renew membership in the Ontario Association of Children's Aid Societies for the year 1953.

There was a lengthy discussion on adoptions of older children in particular. The recent Provincial Report on Child Care and Adoption Services was considered.

After adjournment, the members spent a social hour at the home of Superintendent and Mrs. Thompson.

The first coast-to-coast crossing of Canada by automobile over an all-Canadian route did not occur until 1946. In that year, Brig. R. A. MacFarlane and Kenneth MacGillivray of Toronto drove a stock model Chevrolet from Louisburg, N.S., to Victoria, B.C., in nine days to win a trophy unclaimed since 1912.

About 60 men enrolled 35 members of the Holy Name Society of St. Joseph's Church following a rally Sunday evening. The aims of the society and hopes for the future were described by the special speaker, Roy Weiler of Guelph. He was pleased to see so many at the initial gathering and expressed the hope interest would continue.

Mr. Weiler was introduced by Mike Bennett and thanked by Henry Deveau.

The Holy Name Society is being reorganized in the parish and the following officers were recently chosen: president, Ernest Marks; vice-president, Henry Deveau; secretary, Nino Braida; treasurer, Mike Bennett; committee chairman of the junior group, Denis Papillon.

Mr. Marks welcomed the men present and also a few guests from Georgetown. Father Morgan spoke briefly.

Lunch and entertainment were enjoyed in the church basement following the meeting. Roy Braida, Les Doby and Garret Rose gave musical selections and E. Watson played a 12-stringed guitar. Mr. Doby also led a sing song.

Denis Papillon expressed thanks to the ladies who served refreshments.

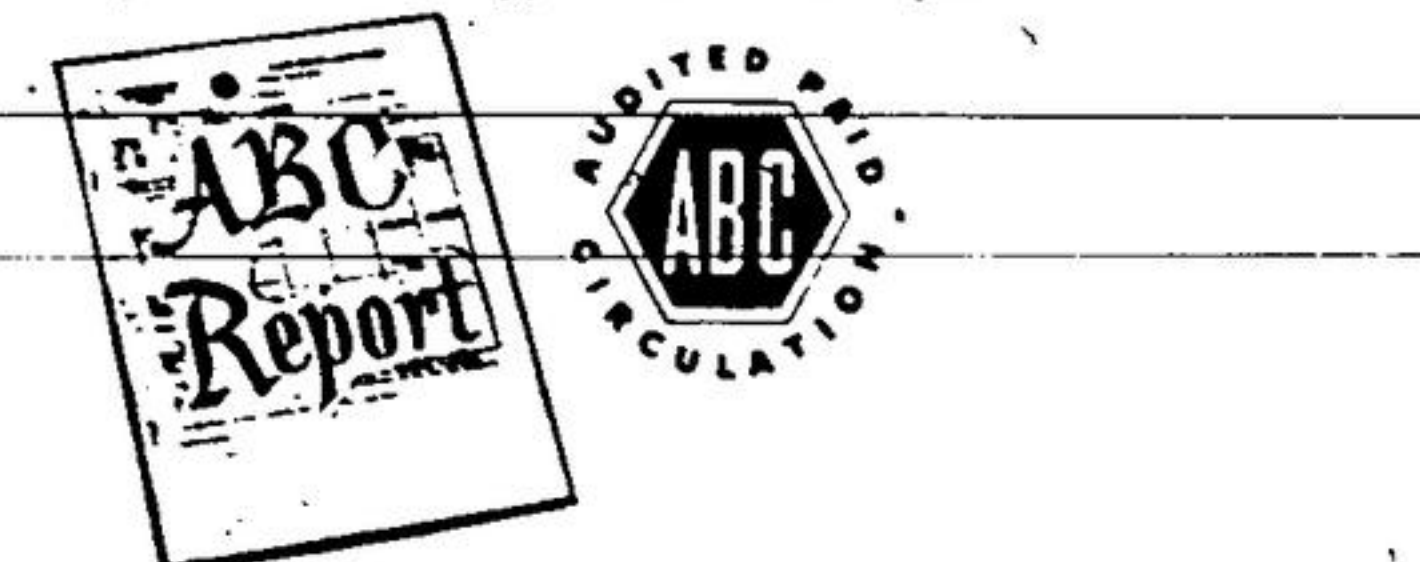
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
