Plan Improvements At Mill St. Park Ave. Corner

The often-shelved plan for improvements in the obstructed view at the corner of Mill St. and Park Ave. may come in for some attention if plans of Acton council at their regular meeting are initiated. The Road committee was authorized to meet with Beardmore representatives and discuss the plan that was presented by Beardmore's firm in blueprint form. It calls for rounding out of the corner by removal of part of the retaining wall and transfer of property on both sides of the street. Part from the town will be transferred to Beardmore's and an equal sized piece will be transferred to the town on the other side of the street. The transfer would not affect the present travelled section of the road.

Council received with regret the resignation of G. Muselle as town assessment commissioner. The clerk was instructed to advise for applicants to the position.

Council decided not to proceed with the construction of additional sludge beds at the sewer plant. It was pointed out that F. Somerville had acquired the proper type truck to move the sludge at no cost to the town. It was thought some type of agreement should be made and thus was to be investigated.

Council was informed that two motors had burned out at the sewer plant within six days. Possibilities of low voltage power were to be investigated.

The industrial water rates came in for considerable discussion but no action is to be taken until comparative consumption figures are presented to council. A request for additional industrial water was referred to council.

The Industrial committee was instructed to visit Baxter Laboratories officials regarding the selling of a part of the line passing their plant. The solicitor reported that it was quite legal for the town to sell this property.

It was reported that dog and poll tax was being collected and overdue accounts were to be forwarded to the baillif for collection.

Separate by-laws were read approving the payment of salaries to the mayor and council. The by-laws received two readings and was forwarded to the Municipal Board.

Transfers to the Public Utilities Commission of \$1,000 from the 1953 levy, \$1,666.67 for transfers to capital expenditures and \$136.80 for rebate on fence was approved.

Payment of grants of \$500 to the Band, \$700 to the Planning Board and \$300 to the firemen were approved.

The \$20 rental of the arena for the Holloween party was refunded to the Y.M.C.A. Club.

Tuesday and Thursday nights were granted to the Minor Sports committee for the arena winter program for the 1953-54 season. A request from the Eisens' hockey club for use of the arena on Monday night was held over for further consideration.

Boxing Day was proclaimed a holiday being the day following Christmas Day.

Clean up operations were to be requested on the piece of property in the Leishman survey designated as a park.
