Poultry Short Course Revised

A recent announcement by Prof. J. R. Cavers, head of the Poultry Department at the O.A.C., reveals that the special Poultry Short Course at the Ontario Agricultural College, formerly of four weeks' duration, has been reduced to a course of two weeks. The course has also been designed to help people who cannot spend more than a few days away from their farm or business. For example, the first week, Jan. 4 to 8, deals mainly with Egg Production. The second week, Jan. 11 to 15, deals with the various aspects of Meat Production. Students may enrol for either one, or two weeks. Those interested in turkeys can attend the special sessions on January 13 and 14, or those particularly interested in Broilers can attend the sessions on January 14 and 15.
