Halton Meeting Favors Compulsory Calfhood Vaccination

The control of Brucellosis or Bang's Disease by calfhood vaccination was the subject of Dr H. Worton's address at a meeting sponsored by the Halton Livestock Improvement Association held in the Court House, Milton, on Monday afternoon of last week.

Dr Worton who is provincial veterinarian under the Ontario Livestock Branch, briefly reviewed the early history of the disease which was first identified in North America in 1910 and its relationship to undulant fever in humans. Since the inauguration of vaccination of calves between the ages of six and nine months, bang's disease is no longer the number one scourge of the cattle industry.

According to Dr. Worton, 177,000 heifer calves were vaccinated in Ontario in 1952. However, according to statistics 500,000 head of cattle were born in 1952 which would indicate that only approximately 35 per cent were vaccinated. It was suggested to the meeting to encourage representatives of the Ontario Department of Agriculture to attempt to force the acceptance of the compulsory calfhood vaccination in Halton Meetings would however be held in each township and the cattle owners in each township will then decide whether or not they want to proceed further or not. 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which will eliminate the tendency which some cattle owners now have to forget to advise their veterinarian until their calves are in some cases over 12 months of age. This, according to Dr. C. H. Heslop is one of the problems under the voluntary plan now in operation.

The meeting on December 11th unanimously went on record as being in favor of compulsory calfhood vaccination and to this end recommended that one or more meetings be held in each township of the county early in 1954 when the procedure would be explained.

(3) Sheep Housing

(4) Poultry Housing

(5) Fruit and Vegetable Storage

(6) Grain Storage

(7) Special Buildings

At the moment, however, we are under the impression that the only set of plans available pertain to Beef Cattle Housing.
